

Wenhaston Warbler Wine

I think most people know that Rosé (pink) wines are usually made by crushing red grapes and leaving the juice in contact with the skins for a short time (usually a matter of hours); running off the coloured juice and then fermenting it.

A recent trend has been for Rosés to become lighter in colour than the traditional deep pink in an attempt to ape the very pale (and expensive) Rosés of Provence. However, good Rosés need not be expensive. Two to try are La Vielle Ferme Rosé 2015 from Southern Rhone and Adnam's Garnacha Rosato from Northern Spain. The former is fashionably pale, soft and strawberry scented. It costs £6-99 a bottle from the Co-op. The Adnams is a touch darker and tangier. It is also good value at £6-99. Both go with a wide range of al fresco food. Both are made using the Grenache grape variety (it's called Garnacha in Spain) which is pale-skinned to begin with. Two things to remember with Rosés. Buy them young and chill them well. Bernard Orme

Mobile Phone Fraud.

I have been scammed on my mobile phone and wondered if an article in the Warbler might be of use to other mobile phone users.

I have a pay as you go mobile phone and had noticed that the last few times when I topped up my phone the credit would soon disappear.

I don't use my mobile a lot so was concerned where all my credit was going. I topped up this week and within hours £4.50 had disappeared from my credit, and I had not used my phone.

After a bit of detective work, I noticed that I had received an undesirable text and although I did not open the text, it still took £4.50 from my credit. Looking back on my records, I found 5 texts from this organisation, which accounted for all my lost credit.

I contacted my mobile provider, and they barred premium rate texts from my phone and also gave me the telephone number of the company sending these texts. I rang them and informed them that they were stealing money from me, and that I would contact the Police as it was fraud, also that I wanted all my money back. They have said they will reimburse me by cheque within 10 days. Do not give them your bank details, just your address. Do check your bills or credit if you think you are paying too much or losing credit and get in touch with your provider. They will also give you a number to stop these texts. Do not use the number that some of these messages tell you to use, as you will be charged £4.50 and the texts will still keep coming. Mobile phone numbers are sold on to all sorts of people who only have intentions of gaining money illegally
