

CARE4CALAIS

Earlier this month I spent a week in the Calais Jungle, the largest makeshift refugee camp on the French coast. 5,000 people, mainly young men, live here in the hope of reaching the UK to seek asylum. I went to support the work of Care4Calais, which handles food and clothing distribution in the camp, to stand in solidarity with those living there, and to better understand the realities of the refugee crisis, a mere 26 miles from our shores.

Having existed in various forms since 2002, the camp does have some critical infrastructure in place. However, its existence is marked by deep instability. A third of the camp was cleared by police at the end of January. The day after I returned it was promised a further half would be cleared in the next week. This will lead to the loss of the heart of the camp; 3 churches, a mosque, a library, the women and children's support centre and the legal centre, as well as the shelters of around 1500 people. The existence of these institutions in the first instance demonstrates the incredible semblance of normality and community people are able to build in the scarcest of conditions. They all will be brought to the ground when the bulldozers come in.

The situation is, of course, politically complex, but from a humanitarian perspective, conditions are dire. Since the settlement is not an established refugee camp, the multinational charities you might expect to see, do not work there. For anyone looking to learn more www.care4calais.org has some great resources and signposts ways to help from the UK.

Wenhaston Gardeners February report.

With all the tips that our speaker, Karen Kenny, gave us, we should have gardens free of; viruses, bacteria, fungi and all sorts of nasties. Prevention is the key. Firstly be sure to buy resistant plants, mulch beds to keep in the goodness in the soil. Place pernicious weeds in water and when they are reduced to sludge (lovely) use the fluid to water other plants, and then use the sludge as mulch. Thus the nutrients in the weeds are returned to the soil. Be sure to carry a container with water and disinfectant in when pruning shrubs with diseased limbs. Why? To place the secateurs in so that they don't spread disease to other healthy plants which you might be pruning. Diluted milk sprayed on phlox helps to eradicate mildew and soapy water deters aphids. Karen was emphatic that costly chemicals are not needed to keep your garden healthy.

The club is visiting Wisley on Wednesday 18th May; why not join us as non-members are very welcome. We leave the village hall at 8.00am in an executive coach (only the best for Wenhaston Gardeners) arriving at Wisley at about 11.40 having enjoyed a comfort stop. The cost is only £22. – a snitch! www = Wenhaston Warbler Wine

This month I am indebted to neighbours and friends for pointing me towards inexpensive but perfectly enjoyable wines. Firstly, a red – another Syrah from the south of France sold under the name Les Rosbifs. Medium weight with a nice bouquet and a dry finish, it would go well with all the usual suspects; beef, lamb, pizza and hard cheeses. My friend bought it at Sainsbury's for £5-50 a bottle down from its usual £7.

Another great value red wine from Spain – Toro Loco 2014. This is a smooth, juicy Tempranillo to which a tiny amount of Bobol (another Spanish grape) has been added. It's at Aldi at the silly price of £3-49 a bottle.

Finally, a pleasant white; a blend of Chenin Blanc and Chardonnay from South Africa The brand is Namaqua and the name of the wine is Elephant River. The style is citrusy and clean but not lean. Drink with chicken and white fish. I bought it at our village shop – Heathside Storesfor £3-99; well under half the list price. It's also available at local Co-ops but you'll have to pay £6-75 a bottle there.

Southwold Railway Trust Report, February 2016

Frust land at Blyford Lane, our neighbour has com

On the Trust land at Blyford Lane, our neighbour has completed the drainage work planned for this winter. The low-lying pastures along the Blyth have a well-designed drainage system in place, but this has not really been maintained for several decades. Naturally, the work has been extensive, and the area is not a pretty sight just now – but the banks of the newly-cleared channels will soon grass over, and will provide not only a much better-drained pasturage, but also clearer water flow. As soon as the land dries enough from the new drainage to make it possible, the fencing contractor will be onsite to provide the new stockproof boundaries to the five acres of Trust land. Trust volunteers will also be using the locally-sourced stone (you will have seen the piles by our entrance) to improve the shared new rights-ofway and access, in compliance with the land sale agreement. They will also be working to complete the restoration of the railway fencing along our southern boundary. The independent Inspector's visit, in connection with the charity's appeal took place on Tuesday February 9th: a decision is hoped for by Easter. There has been some comment locally about access to the land. The situation now is that the Trust cannot take the responsibility for unauthorised access by non-members, as the Public Liability Insurance would not cover this. Trustees have an unlimited legal personal liability in this matter. However, the Trust is very anxious to extend access to as many local people as possible. Access is guaranteed, at any and all times, to members – after all, the Trust, as a democratic organisation, holds the land on behalf of its members. It is also very much in the interest of Wenhaston and Mells residents to join the many existing local members, and become part of this charity. They can then have influence on the Trust's decision-making, which is done on a onemember-one-vote basis. For less than 29p per week (adult membership is only £15 per year, and junior half that), Wenhaston residents can help to decide Trust policy, help us in stewardship of the land and access Trust land freely at any time. Between black branches, a most precious space....


Pop into St Peter's each week and see what's there to 'play with', contemplate, take home for deepening reflection.

A Taste of Village Life

Community awareness and social cohesion are vital ingredients of village life and where better to find this than at Wenhaston Village Hall where numerous changes and new enterprises have been introduced to give wider appeal. The Café is now a popular venue on Wednesday and Saturday mornings for an array of beverages and delicious cakes. It is manned by volunteers serving sweet and savoury treats and on the first Wednesday in the month a full English is served at the 'Men's Shed' event from 8.30am until 10am. All profits from The Cafe go the village hall which is a registered charity.

Film nights occur twice a month. On the first Saturday popular films are screened and on the third Thursday selections are made from world cinema. Once again all profits are in aid of the village hall. A welcome refurbishment was the recently-installed LED lighting, with useful dimmer facility and the Village Hall Management Committee is justly proud of the hall's green credentials, boasting a large roof array of photo-voltaic panels and a wood chip boiler.

The 100 Club recently purchased two Kurling sets and once a month eight teams of four meet to fight it out in what is a great fun evening. Private bookings range from parties and wedding receptions to joint council meetings and book launches. Hire of the hall includes the use of good kitchen facilities and disabled access. Other village hall users include the Wine Club, Art and Craft, Youth Club, WI, Parish Council, Wenhaston Commons Group, Exercise Group, Gardeners' Club, WEA, Bingo and the Drop-In Club. Regular calendar favourites include jumble sales, church lunches, Christmas bazaar, table-top sales, village show and art events. Well-stocked book shelves enable anyone to borrow books and magazines on

a read and return basis and donate items if appropriate.

A defibrillator for emergency use in case of a cardiac arrest has been installed outside the village hall, following an initiative by the East of England Co-op. Community First Responder Co-ordinator Gus Jones gave

practical demonstrations on its use.

The Post Office, another vital village service, is open Monday to Friday from 9am to 1pm and run by Jane Peters. A doctor's surgery, operated by the Reydon practice, takes place on Thursday afternoons. Regular blood donor sessions are also held at the village hall and a bottle bank facility is available in the car park. All these activities provide an invigorating mix with which to celebrate village life in Wenhaston. A warm welcome awaits visitors to the village hall.
