Once a week Sue Gow and Felicity Jelliff trundle along to Halesworth to attend the Cutting Edge Writers Group at the Cut. This year sees the publication of the second anthology the group has produced, in which Sue and Felicity have several pieces.

Sue's introduction to story-telling began with her gaggle of Irish great-aunts steeped in oral traditions. A voracious reader, as a child she wrote stories for her younger siblings and as a drama teacher, helped her class with their stories. She hopes to write a book in the future.

Brought up in a literary family, Felicity has carried on the tradition. She has had two small books published, 'Vegetarians and Custard', about her experience of running a restaurant and 'Pollywiggles in the Run', a history of the village, delightfully illustrated by Wil Harvey. They greatly enjoy the class, which helps them with the mechanics of writing and inspires them to stretch their imaginations with prose and poetry, to be included in the third anthology.

Blyth Woods Community Woodland "Grove Piece Celebration Draws A Crowd"



On a shivering misty morning in late December, at the end of an unforgettable year, and beyond the end of a long slippery muddy path came a bunch of enthusiastic and curious supporters. Posters promised a treasure hunt, a tree to plant, food and drink – no-one was disappointed. After being given the Licence to Occupy the Grove Piece field, this was our first experience of carrying everything to the field in barrows and bags. Gingerbread stars, Bramfield cider, hot potatoes, more mince pies and hot coffee gave us enough energy to tramp

to the centre and see Ann Edwards plant the first hornbeam, echoing the legacy of splendid coppiced specimens in Vicarage Grove. Three cheers then some of the brave ones continued over the sticky clay to admire the hedges, and peer down into the ponds beyond the borders. This year our new pond will be dug on the water-logged patch near the eastern boundary. By the end of this year we should be the proud owners of this beautiful plot – thanks to very successful fund-raising by past and present steering group members.

In mid-January, after snow in the morning, sun came out and we walked along the windy footpaths to Grove Piece with Years 6 and 7 and family members to launch the first planting programme. Having lifted the latest batch of oak seedlings from the school, they planted them in the sunniest patch of the plot. Wading ankle-deep in the sticky clay, they eased in the roots, secured the trees with guards and stakes, then mulched them. It was a wonderful thing to stand back and see the beginnings of new woodland. A reporter and a photographer from the East Anglian Daily News were there to record the event. A fine way to start another extraordinary year, connecting up more and more corridors of natural diversity, laying down a legacy for years to come, while engaging a broadening sweep of the community. Wenhaston Warbler Wine

I expect that you will have noticed that supermarkets, in general, reported improved sales over the Festive Season. I don't know what proportion of the improvement was due to sales of wine and spirits but there is, I believe, a discernible drive towards quality in the drinks sector. This is as true for the discounters, Lidl and Aldi, as it is for the long-established players in the food business.

Most supermarkets have a "benchmark" range of wines which aim to provide good quality wines at competitive prices. For example, Morrisons have their "Signature" range, Co-op's is the "Truly Irresistible" range (who thought of that!), Tesco's is the "Finest" range, Sainsbury's is "Taste the Difference, and Aldi have their "Exquisite Collection". The final arbiter of quality, of course, is your palate, but I would contend that these ranges, by and large, offer consistent quality at a reasonable price. (They're not all single figure bottles, though). If you're in a supermarket and uncertain as to what represents good value for money, here are a few suggestions. For a fishy course (or even fish and chips with salt and vinegar) Morrisons' Signature Sauvingnon Blanc Tourraine. France should fit the bill. For roast chicken the Co-op have "Truly Irresistible" Chardonnay from Australia. It's big, bold and juicy for about £7. If you want more elegance try Finest White Burgundy, Vignerons de Buxy from Tesco. It'll cost you another £1, but you'll buy more complexity for that. As for reds, if you're a Shiraz fan, sample Finest Limestone Coast Shiraz, Australia from Tesco or Taste the Difference Fairtrade Shiraz from Sainsbury's (about £7). Both are dark, powerful and juicy. Just the job with a warming beef stew. Somewhat more refined is 2012 Chateau Jouanin, Castillon Cotes de Bordeaux, France from the Co-op. It's not from the Truly Irresistible range but if you're in the Co-op and want a value claret, go for it. Last, but not least, a red from Aldi's Exquisite Collection - 2014 Hawke's Bay Merlot, Malbec. Cabernet blend from New Zealand, About £7. Bernard Orme

There were a variety of questions, from a strange growth on the stems of roses to dealing with lily beetle. The former turned out to be lichen and could be scrubbed off with a toothbrush. It was caused by Wenhaston's unpolluted air. To combat the lily beetle we were told to grow the flowers in tubs as in the winter it is easier to find the bulbs and to peel them back to find these little devils. A not generally known fact is that crushed lily beetles are being used in lipsticks instead of cochineals which are becoming so scarce.

Christmas already seems a long time ago but mention of the successful party won't come a miss. Ancestral Voices entertained us with their Tudor music interspersed with snippets of information on the period. A hot buffet was provided and enjoyed by all.
