March Birds 'Spring' into Action

It's a time of high activity amongst our garden birds. Winter visitors, such as redwing and fieldfare, take off on their journey to distant breeding grounds as far away as the Arctic Circle.

They have survived the winter by feeding on our own

berry-bearing shrubs such as cotoneaster, pyracantha, rowan and hawthorn, but prefer to move to birch forests for breeding.

Summer visitors start to arrive. Chiffchaffs and blackcaps will soon be singing in our woodlands and gardens. Others will be making their way from various parts of southern Europe and Africa. It's a sobering thought that cuckoos, having left their winter quarters in the Congo rainforest, are heading to their first stopover in West Africa, where they will rest and feed-up before attempting the hazardous crossing of the formidable Sahara Desert and the flight back to the UK.

Birds pair up, nest sites are chosen, and the males sing, display and often fight to defend their territories. As nest building begins, robins, sparrows, blackbirds and other garden birds fly back and forth with twigs and other plant debris. We can help them by tying up bunches of tiny twigs, dried moss, and other stringy vegetable matter near our feeders.

Tits choose the softest nesting materials they can find – dog or cat hair, dried grass, fluffy seed heads and even cobwebs! Robins build their nests from equally soft materials and moss so, if you groom your pet, distribute the discarded fur in the nooks and crannies of your walls and hedges. Before the long-tailed tit can lay eggs, it must build what is perhaps Britain's most intricate and labour-intensive nest; a soft dome constructed from thousands of pieces of moss stuck together by strands of cobweb. It is sprinkled with lichen fragments for protection and stuffed with feathers for insulation. The nest takes about three weeks to build and, when finished, will house an average of eight young.

And please spare a thought for the poor old male wren. He may have to build up to 6 nests before the female accepts one! Roland Hammond

The Future of the Patrick Stead Hospital

The NHS Great Yarmouth and Waveney Clinical Commissioning Group have begun a 4-week public engagement exercise into the future of the Patrick Stead Hospital site, which will run from Monday 5th February 2018 until 5th March 2018. The proposal would mean the closure of the Patrick Stead Hospital and the health and social day care services currently provided from Rayner Green ceasing and no longer being funded by the NHS. The CCG have agreed the sum of £1.3m to fund a South Waveney Out of hospital team, beds with care and a new minor injury service, which would become effective from 1st January 2018. With these new services in place, they no longer have a need to provide in-patient-beds at PSH, and with only outpatient services on site, the hospital, physiotherapy block and most of the surrounding land would be put up for sale.

All the services currently provided from the main hospital building; phlebotomy, diabetic eye screening and the abdominal aortic aneurysm clinic, which have been provided from the hospital for the last 12 months would be transferred to the Rayner Green Resource Centre Building. All East Coast Community Healthcare services currently provided from the Physiotherapy Block; physio, podiatry, continence, lower urinary tract symptoms (LUTS), occupational therapists and neurology specialist nurse clinics, would also be transferred into the Rayner Green Resource Centre. Once the public engagement exercise is complete, a final decision about the services provided on site will be agreed at the CCG Governing Body meeting on 22nd March 2018.

People can share their views on an online survey, until 5th March, by visiting https://www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/rayner_green/ or there are paper copies available to complete in Halesworth Library. Please do make your thoughts and feelings known

In the meantime, we are in discussions with Suffolk County Council and Social Services, looking at options to enable provision of social day care services in Halesworth for the interim period. We will keep you updated with progress.

Wenhaston Save Our Swifts.

Did you know that swifts are about be listed as **officially endangered**? Here in Wenhaston swifts return to their nest from Africa every May and we are familiar with the summer 'screaming parties'. But numbers are declining. Imagine a summer's evening without swifts swooping across the sky?

There are two main reasons for their decline in the UK. First, loss of nest sites. Developments in new roof construction, roof renovation and insulations have sealed off entrances, or potential entrances to swift nest sites. Swifts return every spring to the same nest site. As soon as a site is lost, the pair occupying that site will not breed again. The second reason for their decline is the loss of food source. Aerial insect numbers have declined by 75% in the last 30 years and as much as 82% in the swift breeding season.

We can help the swift population in Wenhaston by addressing both of these difficulties. The Suffolk Wildlife Trust will work with us in the village to help create and install nest boxes. But we want to go further! We want to record swift numbers in Wenhaston, celebrate "swift arrival day" in early May and increase insect-friendly flowers in our gardens, verges and wastelands.

By working together with wild-life friendly organisations in the village and the school, we can increase awareness of our swift population generally and we can really make a difference before it's too late and they've all gone.

How can we begin?

Learn more about swifts: Edward Jackson, the Suffolk Wildlife Trust's swift expert and an excellent speaker has agreed to give a talk at the <u>Wenhaston Commons Group AGM on March 20th</u> where all are welcome. (see details elsewhere in this month's Warbler).

Understand Wenhaston's swift population: We need to know our own swift numbers and record nest sites. Do they nest in your roof? You can tell the two Suffolk Wildlife Trust swift co-ordinators when you see the first swift arrive in early May and whether there is a pair nesting in your roof. Install swift nest box/s on your house. Further information will be available about where to get help with installing a swift box or an array of boxes. Swifts do not leave any droppings in or around their nest.

Increase insect numbers by seeding or planting more insect-friendly flowering plants in your garden. Further information will be published here or on the Village Notice Board, or contact Alan or Jonathan.

Wenhaston Warbler Wine

Last month I recommended a couple of white wines that would help counter overindulgence but still provide drinking pleasure. As we approach the end of winter I feel we need something more rounded and definitely fruity. South African chenin blancs are bright and cheerful with plenty of apple, pear, peach and melon flavours. They are dry (or nearly so), refreshing but rarely lean. Here are three to try, all well under a tenner. First, Cambalala Chenin Blanc 2017, Western Cape from Aldi. It's OK on its own or with seafood-based dishes. Price is a cool £3-89 a bottle. Second, The Irresistible Chenin Blanc from the Co-op supermarket. More deeply-coloured and flavoured it will go with chicken and pork in almost any guise. It's £6-99 a bottle. Finally, Waitrose's Fairtrade Chenin Blanc 2017 has plenty of juicy apple flavour and a fresh, clean finish. Try it with chicken or fish pie. It costs £5-99. Roll on Spring!

February Report for Wenhaston W.I.

Gus Jones' talk on Pizza, Polizia and Mafia certainly lived up to its intriguing title.

Gus joined the Kent police in 1965 before moving to Scotland Yard where he was involved in fighting organised crime, coming up against notorious criminals including the Kray family. Moving on he joined the National Drugs Intelligence Unit. For a while he was sent to Italy and lived in the grounds of the magnificent Villa Wolkinsky, given to the English as a war prize. It was in his time here that he met Judge Giovanni Falcone, famous for his 400 convictions of the Mafia.

Gus told us of the many ways drug traffickers smuggle their illegal goods across the world. They had a tip off about a boat sailing to the Netherlands. When it arrived, it was noted that the bow was very deep in the water, it was searched with dogs but nothing was found. They discovered a concrete block which when destroyed revealed another block under which was a stash of drugs.

It seems London is the hub of all money laundering, placed as it is between the West Indies and the Middle East. It's a wicked world out there.

East Anglian Solitude.

An East Anglian Solitude" will be performed at Blythburgh Church on the evening of Saturday, 28th April, 2018.

The programme includes readings by the former Beirut hostage and Archbishop of Canterbury's special envoy Terry Waite CBE together with 16th century choral music performed by composer William Drew Batty's new chamber choir, Renaissance. The music featured is composed by some of the greatest names of the English renaissance period and all had connections with East Anglia. Terry's readings are complemented by reflections on solitude by composers such as William Byrd, Thomas Tallis, Christopher The and Orlando Gibbons. There is a mix of secular and non-secular music from the period, including songs by the great madrigalist John Wilby of Hengrave Hall and Thomas Morley, who became organist at Norwich Cathedral when he was only 16!

The evening will include an extract from 'Songs of Solitude', written by Terry Waite and the local composer William Drew-Batty, the choir's director. This was performed at Norwich Cathedral in 1997. Also, in the evening's performance will be Drew-Batty's recent work 'When David Heard' which includes text by the poet Rupert Brooke.

As well as choir soloists, Jake Barlow is the Counter-tenor and Jonathan Palman the organist. Also included in the ticket price of £12 is a drink (alcohol and non-alcohol) and canapés. Terry Waite will be available afterwards to chat and to sign his book 'Solitude'.

Tickets will be available from Halesworth Bookshop, Southwold Books and Wenhaston Post Office, by the end of February, and posters will be available soon too. I can forward this and further details to you.
