VE Day Past and Present



On VE Day, 1945 I was one year old. Grown-ups talked a great deal about the war throughout my childhood. Wenhaston families would have welcomed back their loved ones after six bleak years. Far fewer men died in WW2 compared with The Great War, as the village memorial so graphically shows, but every death was a family tragedy.

The weather on May 8th 1945 was 'generally warm with sporadic outbreaks of rain', chilly in

Gorleston at 11.7c, 17.8 at Felixstowe. On May 8th 2020 it was a beautiful summer's day with strong sunshine, a dazzling Suffolk blue sky and a top temperature of 22c. We couldn't celebrate in groups but TV coverage was excellent and we toasted the Queen's health in the evening.

The daily news is in stark contrast to the beautiful spring with record sunshine and little rain. Our landscape looks wonderful, the shape of fields, the hedges and patterns of settlements. It is not 'brass band scenery' but it is subtle, gentle, rich and varied. It has been farmed for more than 4,000 years. Surplus wealth from this land has produced a rich culture. The word 'culture' itself derives from 'coulter', the cutting blade of the plough.

We have a huge range of wild flowers - Archangel - whose name derives from the resemblance of its paired leaves to the wings of an angel; bluebells in Vicarage Grove and the east bank of Marsh Farm, and great masses of Alexanders. Bracken grows at a furious rate on Black Heath and has a pedigree of over 50 million years. Sadly, Merton Wood is now full of dying Ash trees. The Sand Martins arrived at the beginning of April and have increased from 6 to well over 40! and Venus has been magnificent in the bright sky.

Village hall news

The village hall was successful in applying for a Government Covid 19 Retail, Hospitality and Leisure Business Support Grant, to help us with our running costs while we are closed. The grant was administered by East Suffolk Council via the business rates system. It is a tremendous relief to know that we have funds available to help us cover these costs which last year were £19,000, including over £5,000 for maintenance and repairs. We have reduced some direct debits and extended the terms of the licences we are able to, and have a cash flow in place up until the end of October, so are keeping a close eye on our finances. The hall is being regularly checked several times a week to ensure all is well.

We planted a new native species hedge along the fence by the café bar area the day before shutdown. It has now come into leaf and we have a watering rota in place to look after it.

The hall hosted an emergency blood donor session on Friday 1st May and the hall was thoroughly cleaned beforehand and also afterwards, allowing 72 hours to safeguard Janice who cleans the hall for us and who had her own appropriate protection to wear.

As soon as we are able to, we will re-open and look forward to welcoming you to the hall for all the usual activities plus hopefully some new ones! Sally Amery

A bridge and signpost are in place and walkers can now reach Grove Piece through Malster's Little Field.

We have residents in most of the bird boxes and are keeping records of wildlife sightings, including this unexpected visitor, reported by Alan - "Judy and I walked to the wood this morning around 7.10 to do a bird survey, and



as we entered the wood an otter was coming towards us. It shot back into the wood and disappeared. I never thought we would get that on our species list, they do travel across country and search out ponds etc, bit late for our new pond as its now dry!!"

Swifts and Sand Martins are back in Wenhaston!



We recorded our first Wenhaston swift arriving back on 1st May 2020. Since then they've been gathering in numbers – up to 30 screaming



around over the fields and roof tops. The swift flag went up at the Church on 2nd May. Several houses in the village have put up swift nest boxes as a way to provide more nest sites as the number of swifts is still declining. Some nest boxes have a small speaker playing swift calls, which attract the attention of the swifts looking to nest. There are nest boxes at the Village hall, Church and Primary school.

We are keeping records of swift numbers and nest sites, so if you notice Swifts nesting in your roof, please let us know at

Also, the sand martins are back! They first appeared in early April, and have now gathered in numbers and are nesting in the sand pit on Blackheath. Please be careful not to disturb them while you watch from the fenced area.

Halesworth Volunteer Centre

Things Are Changing, But We Are Still Here To Help!

Working with East Suffolk Council, Halesworth Town Council, the local Parish Councils, Halesworth Area Community Transport and other local organisations, Halesworth Volunteer Centre has been co-ordinating the community response to the Covid-19 pandemic, supporting older and vulnerable members of the community living in Halesworth and the surrounding villages. We had an absolutely fantastic response from the community with just over 150 people coming forward to volunteer to help! So far, we have responded to over 950 requests for help. We have been supporting those who are isolating by shopping and delivering for them, collecting and delivering prescriptions, medication and goods, offering telephone befriending support and running errands. The prescriptions are collected and dropped off by a team of volunteers who travel to the Health Centres and pharmacies in Halesworth, Reydon, Wangford and Wrentham. Our volunteer shoppers visit the Co-op on a daily basis. The shopping is delivered by the Hact bus and their team of drivers deliver as far as Blythburgh, Cratfield and Ubbeston, and have now clocked up over 500 miles! We were also delighted to deliver beautiful plants or 'pots of joy' as described by one grateful recipient, kindly donated by Woottens of Wenhaston to just over 100 people, which really did brighten the day for so many. On a different 'note' our socially distanced choir celebrated VE day by singing to people at Highfields in the garden and on driveways, in glorious sunshine. This has been a real community response with everyone coming forward to support others to get through this together, a massive thank you to everyone who has helped so far.

The life of the church during lockdown

Although our church buildings have been closed for two months, the church itself has continue to stay active. As well as contributing to the local efforts to stay in touch with vulnerable and self-isolating residents, we have been livestreaming services via our “Blyth Valley Churches” Facebook page, and holding Zoom café church sessions once a week. Resources have been sent out to people to allow them to join in services and prayer from home. Our online worship has been accessed by a range of people from regular members of our congregations to people tentatively exploring what we are broadcasting.

The Blyth Valley Team have been opening up St Mary’s Halesworth once a week for the Foodbank to run weekly deliveries and a drop in facility. The church has also helped set up a voucher scheme to enable people struggling financially to be able to purchase fresh meat, fruit and vegetables from participating shops in Halesworth.

We are very conscious that this is a particularly hard time for people who have been bereaved. Isolation is difficult enough, but to be isolated and grieving is particularly tough. The church has continued to conduct and care as best it can for bereaved families and friends. I know that messages and gestures of support have really helped when someone has died.

If you would like to find out more about what we are doing, feel you are struggling, financially or personally, or would like us to pray for someone, please feel free to contact me. The church is part of a local Covid-19 community support group, so I can signpost people to services locally that can support them.

Pottering with Poppy

Kate Archibald has been writing 'Nature Notes from Marsh Cottage' for the last year and I am now picking up my pencil to write for a while. Thank you, Kate, for your lovely descriptions of the wildlife you have seen in your wanderings over the meadows. Inevitably my musings will be a little different.

In talking to the folk Poppy and I meet on our walks around the village it is obvious that we are all so thankful for where we live and the joy we get from our surroundings. The footpaths are many and varied and the reason my parents moved to the village in the late 1970's. Poppy and I are now enjoying what they enjoyed.

There is more to the bungalow we live in than meets the eye! It's a bit Tardis like! Get past the front garden and it expands! There is a big back garden which in winter gives glimpses through the leafless trees across the valley to the old Blythburgh hospital. My little birds have survived the recent wind and frost and I hope there are still plenty of insects for their young which will now be in the nest. On our walks I have been aware of little caterpillars dangling on invisible threads from tree branches, excellent fodder for our nesting birds and returning migrants. 'My' blue tits dash about the garden hunting for insects.. The blackbird does acrobatics to get a share of the fat and seeds in the half coconut that hangs on the washing line. Mrs

blackbird doesn't eat from the coconut shell but prefers the ground feeder and the bark mulched border. Both male and female fling the bark about to get at the goodies from the cool and damp beneath. They are now feeding their second brood.

The wren must have a nest not far away, and the pair of dunnocks too, that are constantly in amongst the shrubs, and a greenfinch wheezes from the conifer tops. I don't go delving in the shrubs looking for nest for fear of disturbing them all, but I shall find them if I need to prune or trim much later in the year. In the mean time I shall enjoy what is about in the garden and the hedgerows. ***Jo Small***



Grant for the Bowls Club

Thanks to the initiative of the Officers, Wenhaston Bowls Club will not have to rely on the normal means of income in order to maintain their excellent outdoor green for at least the next two seasons, as they have had a grant application for assistance approved. Bowls England's entire national programme of leagues and cups was cancelled in March when lockdown began, but the greens need the same specialist treatment of fertilizing, scarifying, spiking and regular cutting, if they are to be preserved and kept up to standard, and be ready for a full programme in the 2021 season. This work is in the hands of our greensman David Hambling who is helped by John Robinson, and between them they have transformed the green back to near full life after poor conditions that arose throughout the winter months. In addition, it is hoped that perhaps later in the season some play will be possible this year, and some clubs have spent time working out how they can restart with friendly competitions and roll ups, to keep in line with Government guidelines. It is hope that the Wenhaston club members will be able to have some kind of play on these lines.

As we came to the end of the carpet bowls in March the coronavirus caused our last match to be cancelled. Wenhaston Bowls Club captained by Kevin "Wink" Canham came second in the Heritage Coast Carpet Bowls division One, with 73 points behind Knodishall A, with 100 points. Thanks are due to the effort of the Wenhaston bowlers who were captained by Kevin for the first time. ***Jake Moyes – Hon. Sec.***
