Village Hall News

At the time of writing we are all looking forward to seeing Jane back at the Post Office in the village hall shortly, and we appreciate the valuable service she provides for us all. We have missed you Jane! Although the Post Office will be open on the 15th June the rest of the hall has to remain closed in line with Government instructions, so I am sorry we can't offer a book lending or photocopier service at present. The food bank collection will continue to be at Alison Alder's house Oakhurst, Blackheath Road, Wenhaston, or you can send financial

contributions to Waveney Foodbank, c/o Les Fearns, 15 De Lucy Close, Diss, IP22 24YL.

The earliest the village hall can open, according to the Government guidelines, is 4th July, and that is dependent on what happens with the Coronavirus rate of infection between now and then. We will receive updates in due course, and advice about what the hall has to have in place to keep hall users and volunteers as safe as possible. In the meantime, we are sourcing things we anticipate we will need, many of which are in high demand and short supply and on long order lead in times. We are also giving thought to, and would welcome ideas from others, how various hall activities may be able to re-start in due course.

It will obviously be up to the individual groups to decide when they will re-start and how they safeguard people, but we would like to try and have what the hall will need in place. Things will certainly be different for some time to come it seems.

The new hedge behind the café bar is now in leaf and doing well. We have stopped cutting the grass by the hedge and several wild flowers are now making an appearance. A blue tit has nested in one of the nest boxes and the swift boxes are ready and waiting for new tenants. Christine has re-planted the flower borders and troughs and Jane has put up the colourful hanging baskets again for us to enjoy whilst queueing for the Post Office!

A small team of volunteers working individually, or in couples have decorated the main hallway while we are closed and Janice, our cleaner has deep cleaned the hall and given the floor of the hall and cafe a coat of refresher, to help protect the seal.

Another emergency Blood Donor session will have taken place at the hall on Monday 22nd June, and once again the hall will be thoroughly cleaned before and afterwards.

Sadly, the ever-popular Village show due to take place at the end of July, has had to be cancelled as it would be impossible to maintain

social distancing, and we just don't know what restrictions will still be in force then.

In the meantime, we have many village and local volunteers and local businesses and services to thank for helping us through the lockdown. Good News from Wenhaston Post Office

Wenhaston Post Office is opening from June 15^{th.} Only the Post Office area will be accessible - the hall and all rooms will still be out of use. This includes Photocopying – Food Bank – milk top collection and the reading books and toilets. This is due to the hall still being in lockdown for the time being, following the Government guide lines.

Only one customer at a time will be allowed in, a two-metre distancing whilst queuing outside, and hand sanitizer will be available on the counter. I will take all the precautions possible to maintain a safe area for you. I will be unable to assist anyone on the shop floor as I have to maintain a safe distance for health reasons. I can only accept cash payments for non post office items i.e. cards, stationery etc.

The medication should start being delivered back to the Post Office on Thursday 18th June. Please note I cannot be held responsible if your medication does not get delivered. I offer this service voluntary and do my best to make sure that it arrives.

Please remember my opening hours will be Monday through to Thursday 9.00 am - 1.00 pm and closed on a Friday as before.

First in an occasional series about classic cars in Wenhaston Collectors Corner - A Star Car!



It's fair to say that the 60's and 70's saw both the 'highs' and 'lows' of British car manufacturing. Here's one of the highs. Red and resplendent in The Star's car park, pictured with proud owner Virginia, is her 1971 Reliant Scimitar (SE5A, if you must know). Powered

by a Ford 3.0 litre Essex V6 – originally from the Ford Zodiac range – it is a 2-door sports estate hatchback.

Reliant, more often these days linked in most people's minds with the 'Robin', started producing the Scimitar coupe in 1964, initially with the 2.5 I Zephyr straight 6 engine, in a chassis based on the previous Reliant Sabre and the designer David Ogle's Ogle SX250. Reliant, like much of the British car industry, is sadly no more, closing in 1986.

Carl, not a man normally to wax lyrical, and the past-owner of more 'collectible' cars than you could shake a

gear-stick at, is full of praise for the Scimitar. Practical, reasonably economical, tax exempt, 30mpg, good load space for dogs, & firkins, very comfortable and reliable. Mind you, Virginia points out that you are very low on the road, and the hedges round these parts are often high... Should spares be required, most are Ford parts and readily available.





Foodbank, Community Larder and Fresh Food vouchers

Many thanks to all those who have continued to give generously to the Foodbank during the Covid-19 pandemic. Volunteers are delivering regular boxes to people who are really struggling at the moment. We continue to hold a drop-in session every Wednesday morning at St Mary's Church, Halesworth from 10.30-11.30am. As well as food, donations of washing powder / liquid, baby food, fruit juice and treats would be much appreciated.

From 11th June, a Community Larder has opened at St Mary's Halesworth. Opening every Thursday 9.30-10.30 and Saturday mornings 10.30-11.30, you can donate food, exchange food, take food and leave a donation, or just take food if you need it. Donations of fresh food are welcome. The scheme is run by Halesworth Volunteer Centre in partnership with St Mary's Church and the Blyth Valley Team Ministry. There is also a book exchange running on Thursdays and Saturdays, where you can borrow a book from the library. On return the books are stored for 72 hours before being redistributed, to prevent the risk of infection.

Beetlemania!

We discovered this magnificent looking beetle which turned out to be an Alpine Longhorn Beetle (Rosalia Alpina) in our garden early June.



This is a rare and protected beetle not native to the UK, but more common in the beech forests of SE Europe.

A beetle expert from the Natural History Museum collected it and examined the site for possible

explanations for its presence here - he suspects it was a one-off which probably arrived either in imported beech furniture or beech destined for the sawmill.

If further examples are discovered the experts would like to know. The insect identification service at the Royal Entomological Society website (http://royensoc.co.uk) is a great starting point if you come across an unusual insect.

Pottering with Poppy

It is the eleventh hour, and I am rewriting a pottering Poppy and I did this afternoon! We went to Dunwich forest, one of our favourite places. It is only the third time we have been since

March 23rd and all of them in the last two weeks! It is a place to get lost in the mild air and breezes today and to revel in the bird song and the trees. We avoid the plantations and head for the broad-leaved woods and the heath areas and then down into the boggy stream side.

Today it's mammals that thrill. We are being watched! I look across the open field to the woodland edge beyond, there are four red deer stags with antlers growing well and covered in velvet. They are all aware of us and pause in their grazing and stare. Poppy is not aware of them.

Walking on, the path is edged by trees and gorse and in a gap, I catch a glimpse of two fox cubs. Then the vixen shouts and they are gone! Again, fortunately, Poppy is too busy with other smells and is not aware of them until they are long gone.

The path goes on as if through a tunnel of dense gorse. Earlier this week I heard a Nightingale here and last year, a little further on, Turtle Dove but not today. There are Linnet, Chiffchaff, Robin and Wrens in abundance.

The rhododendron is in flower. I know I shouldn't love it but there is something about its brash, beautiful pinkness that I do. It is a giant thing that creates a dark monoculture habitat, not lovely for wild life, but here it is confined in a small pocket in the larger woodland, so I will enjoy it while it is in bloom.

We go on along the board walk and a grey squirrel scuttles up a tree and Poppy is off to investigate but it is way too fast for a very agile Poppy. After that she must content herself by investigating the plantation we now need to walk through to get back to the car. No doubt lots of creatures have been here and left their scent.
