Medication Collection at Wenhaston Post Office

There is so much medication now being delivered to the Post Office from Halesworth and a lot of it is bulky items. It is impossible to store it all. Space is limited so if you are able to collect your medication from the Surgery please do so.

Items really need to be collected on the day they are delivered. This service was set up for those people in the village who cannot get down to the Surgery and collect their items due to mobility or lack of transport.

The dispensary has advised me to send back any items that have not been collected when the next delivery arrives. Some items are not collected for three weeks or more.

I am very short of space, at the end of each day I have to bring in all my display units to the back of the Post Office, which is like trying to do a jigsaw puzzle.

Seasons Greetings from Blyth Woods

Thanks to Zoom, we were able to hold our AGM on 12th November and it was good to catch up with friends and interested local people. We were impressed with how much had been achieved over the last year when Chair, Ann Edwards, gave her roundup. Her report included:

‘This has been an eventful year in many ways. It was a beautiful spring, despite Covid, and many people began to appreciate and hear the natural world for the first time, as human noise and bustle was quietened.



The year focused on our pursuing our vision for increasing wildlife and woodland areas. Practically, this meant raising the money needed to buy the 1.6 acre triangle of poor agricultural land adjacent to Grove Piece and we ran a series of events including

- A sold out community puddings and starters supper, combined with an auction, raised over £2000
- A huge jumble sale
- A very enjoyable wreath making event
- Stands at the village show and Christmas bazaar
- Sales of cards and produce
- Clay workshop
- Wine and cheese evening for the Friends of Blyth Woods

Work parties have continued the maintenance of Grove Piece: cutting the rides, weeding saplings and replanting where necessary. We have continued the involvement with the school. One highlight was planting the new boundary hedge along Malster's on a very muddy day. It was good to see how many parents, grandparents and carers also came to help. The programme of collecting and planting acorns, weeding and mulching the school tree nursery, tracks and trails and planting new saplings has also continued with the children. As some of us are getting older and stiffer, it is very encouraging to see a new generation taking real interest in the nature around them.

As Tree Wardens for Wenhaston with Mells, we have engaged with the Suffolk Tree Wardens, and taken part in various forums.

Anyone who would like to join us, as part of the steering group, as a Trustee, or joining a work party, we would love to hear from you.'

We will be as busy as ever in 2021 so keep a look out for details of our plans and events. Happy Christmas!

Acting to Protect our Environment - the Blyth Valley Environment Network

The Blyth Valley Team establishing the “Blyth Network,” a way to what is being done environmental facing globally. We held November 3rd and agreed that there were three ways in which we could usefully operate:



of Churches is Valley Environment explore and promote locally to address the challenges we are our first meeting on

1. To provide a forum for different local groups to promote what they are doing and to link up with the knowledge and experience of other groups and initiatives.
2. To increase appreciation in our communities of the natural world and its many benefits for our lives. This includes building up work with young people and families.
3. To join in the campaigns which are fighting for action on national and international levels to tackle the climate crisis.

At the Zoom meeting we heard about the “Parish Environmental Management Plan” for Wenhaston and discussed how a Blyth Valley Environment Network could support this. Wenhaston already has some key projects running. The Commons Group works in partnership with Suffolk Wildlife Trust and the Parish Council to manage the five commons in the village. Blyth Woods manages some existing areas of woodland and works to purchase and develop new woodland in the village. They have worked closely with the village primary school, which has its own tree nursery. The Swift Action Group has encouraged villagers to put up swift nesting boxes to replace the loss of nesting sites in buildings over recent years. There are even 4 nest boxes in the church tower. Several villagers are working with Suffolk Wildlife Trust to manage and monitor the River Blyth and its tributaries. We also heard from Martin Dominic, a member of the URC

church who, for many years, has been following the evidence of climate change and is deeply concerned about its impact on the future of the planet. He updated us on some of the latest manifestations of global warming and led us in a discussion about the vital importance of moving to sustainable lifestyles.

Many of us are aware that without drastic action, parts of the world will become uninhabitable by the end of the century, leading to mass migration on a scale never before imagined. And it is the lifestyles of the wealthiest countries in the world that are damaging the viability of the poorest countries. Charities like Christian Aid are currently campaigning for Climate Justice, particularly as we begin to rebuild our economies after the pandemic.

What can you do?

At the moment our work will mainly be via Zoom, but don't let this put you off. We can post campaign details to people or discuss ideas over the phone.

Nature Notes

My wife and I moved to Wenhashton exactly four years ago. As Lincolnshire immigrants we were warmly welcomed by neighbours and people we met on dog walks. We are glad we came.

We knew the area well from holidays, and my wife's maternal grandparents (Arthur and Florence Musk), came from Newmarket, where a cousin first produced the famous Musk's sausages.

We love the benign climate, the beautiful ancient landscape, the small towns and the coast. Wenhashton is a friendly village, full of people who care about their environment. It is a real place not a chocolate box village.

We live on the edge of Black Heath , a rare survival of a huge expanse of coastal heathland. It needs to be cherished for its often rare flowers and its beautiful foxes and lizards. The

Sand Martins appeared again and flourished.

Towards the end of August our front bank became covered in poppies when we had almost given up hope .They are still flowering at time of writing (November 12th) , a fitting tribute to the fallen of two appalling wars.

The ponds dried up in the summer heat. After record rainfall the ponds are full. On August 21st a sandstorm raged across the road to Walberswick. I came across a slow worm in the middle of Blackheath Road. It resisted being picked up but this was better than being squashed by the next car.

The information board in the churchyard tells us that slow

worms are legless lizards , not snakes.

Predicted meteor showers were obscured by cloud in October but at present Mars is a great sight in the evening sky. On October 23rd Saturn , Jupiter and the moon formed a perfect right -angled triangle . It is worth getting up early to see Venus in the east.

Hopefully we can see a possible end to the pandemic...an effective vaccine would be a perfect Christmas present for everybody !
