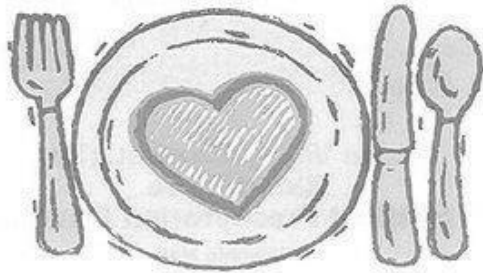

Suffolk Wildlife Trust - The Wildlife of Costa Rica

At our February meeting, the Blyth Valley and Southwold Suffolk Wildlife group were treated to a visit to the tropical country of Costa Rica. Ian Barthorpe, from RSPB Minsmere, gave an account of the wildlife that he and his family enjoyed on their trip there. Wildlife tourism is key to the country's economy, and the natural abundance is carefully nurtured. Ian's wide knowledge and excellent photography skills took us around the country from east to west. The mountainous central spine divides species of birds, although there are strong similarities between them. The Monteverde cloud forests are hung in mists, with high aerial bridges for those with a good head for heights. Knowledgeable guides, skilled at finding hidden creatures, adding enormously to the pleasure, and the family were delighted to end their stay seeing several "must-see" birds, sloths on the move, and a group of Squirrel monkeys.

The beautiful images showing the wide range of animals, and the colour and variety in the tropical landscape, gave us all a restorative boost on a cold winter evening.

"Harvest Mice and Other Small Mammals" is the subject of our next talk on Thursday, March 10th, 7.30pm at Southwold Arts Centre, IP18 6JP. Entrance costs £3, to include refreshments. Under 25's free. All are welcome.

On 12th February we planted 200 trees in Grove Piece. Thank you to everyone who helped in the Work Party.

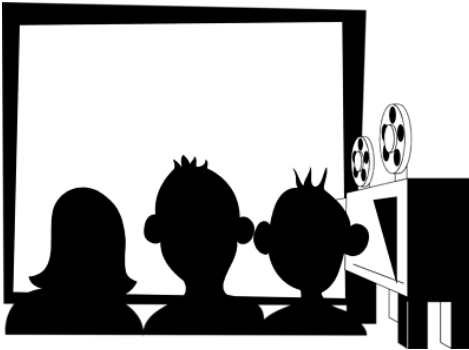

Grave Talk – A café with a difference

“Daddy, what happens when we die?”

Children ask very direct questions about death and dying, yet parents and carers can feel awkward about answering them. Our tendency is to only talk about death if we really have to. Why is death so hard to discuss? It is something none of us can avoid, yet it remains rather a taboo subject.

“Grave Talk” provides an opportunity to explore our attitudes to death in a friendly and relaxed environment. Anyone can book a place. Sitting in small, informal groups, we talk about a range of issues around death, supported by a trained facilitator. Discussions are prompted by randomly selected “Grave Talk” conversation cards, which cover five key areas: life, death, society, funerals and grief. Tea, coffee and homemade cake are provided. Although sessions are organised by Revd. Alison Alder from the Blyth Valley Team Ministry, this is a community project for all people, regardless of their personal or religious beliefs.

Wenhaston Save Our Swifts Action Group



Many of you have enjoyed the annual sights and sounds of swifts which arrive here in early May, having migrated from their winter homes in Africa.

Our group exists to help promote awareness of this amazing bird, and how we can all help maintain, and hopefully increase, its presence in our village and surrounding area each summer.

Numbers of swifts seen in the UK have reduced by around 50% over the last 25

years. This may be related to a drop in insect numbers for food, but also to a reduction in suitable nesting sites. The birds thrive in places where there are still gaps and holes in buildings and under roof eaves, where they can rear their young. Building renovations and new builds often block up previous sites or do not provide them.

Ann Follows founded the group in 2018 and I have recently taken over as group coordinator. We can provide advice and support to villagers who are interested in providing homes for swifts. This year both the Suffolk Bird Group and the Suffolk AONB organisations have offered to provide some swift nesting boxes for sites in Wenhaston. Our group has some funding available to help with installation costs.

Our first meeting of the year is scheduled for Thursday 3rd March. Anyone who is interested in learning more or getting involved would be welcome to attend. Marsh and Garden

The recent high tides further increase the amount of water that lies over the marsh land and fields which border the river Blyth. There are large pools everywhere, and as you walk you intermittently hear the sound of water rushing through the sluices which lead from the field drainage channels into the river. Birds which are more usually seen feeding on the mud of the intertidal zones down river have been coming up with the tide, to feed on watery grass pastures. Later on, as we walking up river another bar tailed godwit was seen in the water on the field on the other side. These water birds seem happy to feed on earthy non vertebrates, such as worms and insects and their larvae. We also saw the familiar sight of a couple of common gulls which stood paddling their feet on the soggy ground. The usual group of curlews, which fly up and down the river and settle on the fields, were joined by a solitary whimbrel following them. Amongst them were also two bar tailed godwits with their characteristic long slightly upturned beaks. Some

mammals apart from the usual native species thrive in the watery environment. One day we were walking back next to the field side ditch that runs parallel to the road from Laurel Farm. A Chinese water deer suddenly jumped up away from us, through the undergrowth, then running uphill across the field to the trees on the



skyline. Apparently, these animals do well in the East Anglian wetlands and do little harm to the native ecology system, as their numbers are not excessive. Back in the garden there are signs of the more invasive muntjac deer, who seem to love Brussels sprouts. It seems that this species is much less shy and enjoys all sorts of plants much to the annoyance of we humans. They are also a threat to regenerating woodland due to their high numbers and the lack of natural predators. **Kate Archibald**
