Following two most successful courses and a one-day ‘Covid catch-up’ session in Wenhaston Village Hall during 2021/22, the autumn 2022 term now approaches. Our course will be “Music in Film” and is described by our tutor, Andrew Fraser, as follows:

“Music in Film” is an exciting foray into the world of cinema and music which will enhance any film lover’s depth of understanding of the medium of film. Have you ever been distracted by a film’s music? Was this a good thing? Writing music for film is a particular skill and affords a special place in the world of composition. From the early days when silent movies were accompanied by live piano or organ playing to today’s expansive spectrum of sounds, the music accompaniment might either elevate our experience of the film or clash with the narrative and scenic progression. It’s not an easy task for composers; here we

create a little time to explore what makes a soundtrack 'in tune', allowing for a truly immersive experience.

The course comprises 7x2 hour sessions starting at 10am on Friday, 30th September. A break for half term falls on Friday, 28th October and the last session will be on Friday, 18th November. New Life in Grove Woods



As I write, we have had no significant rain for weeks. The paths are rock hard between the stubble fields and any once green vegetation is withered and brown. We look with despair at our parched lawns, turned to deserts beneath the relentless sun.

After a hot walk it is a delight to enter the cool shadows of Vicarage Grove, where life has been burgeoning since spring and the work of the Blyth Woods group continues. In fact, in the Grove Woods Breeding Survey of April and June, a total of twenty-two species of birds was recorded, nesting or holding territory, including new visitors sparrowhawk, barn owl (nesting for the first time), garden warbler and linnet. We also had a pleasing increase of blue and great tits fledging from our boxes in Vicarage Grove and Grove Piece.

On a sunny afternoon on 10th July, before the days of record temperatures, we had our annual Blyth Woods Friends' Picnic, which began



with the Bioblitz, a new survey of Malsters Little Field. It gave some interesting results, among them Fragile Stonewort, a pond plant, which is only found in fewer than six locations in the county. Its seeds had laid dormant in the bottom of the pond for years and germinated once the pond was restored. Twelve species of butterfly were recorded in less than two hours, including an Essex Skipper, rarely seen in Suffolk and which needs careful identification to separate it from the Small Skipper, along with many Gatekeepers. Other insects included a Tiger hoverfly, which looks like a wasp but is harmless. Afterwards, our guests retreated to the shade of a gazebo to have a delicious tea of chilled gazpacho, sandwiches and cake.

We were delighted to welcome visitors to our tables at the Village Show on 24th July and are planning more activities for the autumn. If

Wenhaston Save Our Swifts Action Group



The swifts arrived in the village on 9th May this year and I hope everyone has enjoyed the sights and sounds of the screaming parties, particularly over the Star Inn garden and over Back Road and near Chapel Lane. The swifts have pretty much left at the time of writing, 12th August, but we are still waiting to hear if Alan's nest box

swifts have fledged yet! The flag will then come down until next May.

The counts this July were quite similar to last year's counts. A maximum of 102 seen on the later count in the month, both years, with mean variation over both counts of 60-61 this year compared with 37-64 last year. So good news that there was no decline!

We have had documented new nests established in at least four swift boxes. You will have all read Jan Clement's front page feature in last month's warbler showing the ringing of swifts from the swift box at her and Richard's home.

We have been in contact with Zoe at Framingham who provides local help for fallen and ill swifts. She has taken in 53 adult and 17 chicks this year and at time of writing had released all but 3. A fallen swift chick was rescued from the ground near the Star Inn, named 'Star' by Zoe and she grew to be a strong fledgling who was released a few weeks ago. We have donated funds from monies we obtain from activities to her feed fund.

The Swift Pint walk on 2nd July was very enjoyable, with 17 of us at one point, with good weather and plenty of swifts seen. We were

joined by folk from Walberswick, Holton and Halesworth, and it was good to make links with other local groups and individuals interested in swifts.

We have also been able to make links with Suffolk wide swift contacts as well, including the Suffolk bird group and AONB who have been very helpful in providing swift boxes and callers to enthusiastic locals. I would love to hear back from anyone who had boxes installed this year about any interest from swifts as time goes by. It can take at least three years for a swift nest box to become inhabited by swifts and a caller is necessary if the site has no other pre-existing swift nest sites. If anyone is interested to find out more about providing a home for swifts and improving their local environment to help them thrive, check our section of the wenhaston.onesuffolk.net website and also the save our swifts area of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust website.

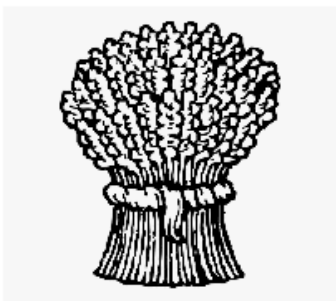
