Home Library Service

Many people struggle to get to their library for various reasons, perhaps because they have a disability or mobility issue.

The Home Library service is there for anyone who loves to read but can't get to the library. It is run by volunteers who pick up books, audio books or DVDs from the library and take them to customers in their own home. The service provides a lifeline for many older and disabled people across Suffolk who also benefit from the regular social interaction too. Volunteers can visit private homes or care homes and operate within COVID guidelines to keep everyone safe.

All volunteers have been through an application, reference and DBS checking process and a training programme.

Iris Mavis Baker

16th September 1930 - 1st November 2022

Iris Baker was born in 1930 in Prittlewell, Essex. She was proud of her birthplace and would correct anybody who thought it was PRETTYwell. She lived there as a child , briefly living in Croydon with her aunt during the war until they were bombed out whereupon she returned home. As a young woman, she trained as a nurse and worked in St Georges Hospital ,Ilford. She cared for people all her life.

She had a well developed sense of humour. One night after returning from a dance with her friend Mabel two Tommies followed them and kept asking if they could have a bed for the night. To Mabel's horror she heard Iris say she could provide them with a bed. The unsuspecting Tommies were therefore somewhat surprised when Iris,en route, waltzed them up to the nearby police station and told the duty officer that "these lads would like a bed for the night" and continued to walk home. She eventually met and married her husband Cyril through their mutual love of dancing. They had two children; David and Joanne and adopted a third, Karen. She was a wonderful cook and flower arranger and her dinner parties were renowned. These gifts were passed on to her children.

On retirement, Cyril and Iris moved to Wenhaston. She joined the W.I. making many friends and eventually became President. She was also a leading light in Wenhaston Am. Dram. group and together with producer Dorothy Franklin put on events that many people in the village fondly recall. She was a practising Christian from childhood and joined the members of the Methodist chapel.

When Cyril died, she became even more involved, always organising events and helping out with others. She, together with her good friends, Dilys Grimwade and Rosemary Remy, became a lay preacher. She instigated and was part of a team who regularly put on little play-

lets in Wenhaston Primary School to help children understand the Bible when they "Opened the Book".

At the annual Christmas carol service in St Peter's church, it became tradition that Iris opened the service, singing the first verse of "Once in Royal David's City, solo.

She was great company until the last; always smartly dressed and taking such interest in everything and everybody. A good life well lived. Iris touched so many lives in Wenhaston, and we who were fortunate enough to know her will miss her very much. *Helen Bowyer*

Creating a wildlife friendly garden, or area within a garden, to provide habitats for wildlife and the plants that support them, is important to maintain biodiversity in our local landscape. You may not realise but even small changes can be effective in helping the garden to support wildlife and it can help to create wildlife corridors throughout the village. This improves feeding opportunities and habitat for birds, insects, and mammals (aka Birds, Bugs, and Beasts). An essential part of this includes encouraging the creation of new, or management of existing, garden ponds for wildlife.

A small group (Ann Follows, Judy Miller, Tony & Sue Gow) within the 'Wilder Wenhaston' project have worked together on the Wilder Gardens objective, beginning with developing a survey to help map what's already being done for wildlife in gardens across the parish.

We invite you to take part by completing the survey, found in the green centre of this month's Warbler. Please complete as a hard copy and drop off in the Wilder Wenhaston (survey) Village Hall folder or opt to complete and return one electronically by emailing us via the group email wilderwenhaston@gmail.com (Heading SURVEY)

With early responses, we hope to be able to report back after Easter on the parish picture, helping us to identify great practice for sharing and identifying those who would like to do a bit more. We will feed back to individuals, where an email is provided, and in the Warbler and on the Wilder Wenhaston page of the parish website (<https://wenhaston.onesuffolk.net/village-life/environmental-groups/wilder-wenhaston/wilder-wenhaston>). Later this year we will be running an open 'wild' garden scheme, and offering a

'wilder/wildlife' habitat advisory service in the parish, and we hope that you find these initiatives useful, and join us in working towards a wilder, greener Wenhaston.

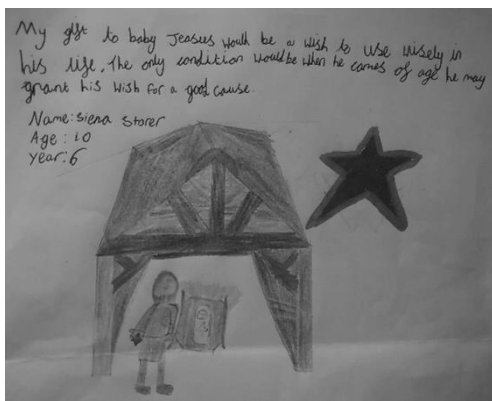

East Anglia's Changing Coastline

At the January meeting of the Blyth Valley and Southwold Suffolk Wildlife Trust group, Adam Burrows, from Natural England, gave a fascinating illustrated talk on the constantly changing coastline of East Anglia. We were able to follow the historic changes from Neolithic times through to Roman and Medieval periods, when terrible storms brought about the loss of many sea ports, Dunwich being our local example. However, the immense wetland fens and marshes of that period teemed with abundant wildlife. Bitterns were in such abundance that, at one lordly banquet, two hundred were served roasted.

Since the terrible floods of 1953, coastal protection became paramount and sea walls were created along coasts and rivers to protect people and property. The need for sea defence has in recent years increased, but the approach to how it is to be achieved is altering. The local audience are well aware of the crumbling, soft cliffs in our area, and the predictions for the loss of land over the next 50

years is sobering. Towns continue to maintain hard sea defences, but elsewhere a managed retreat is considered the best option, and different solutions are needed. Some beaches, as at Dunwich, are allowed to become more extensive and resilient, with localised dykes and outflows where necessary: elsewhere, sea defences further inland will be built, allowing more extensive and bio-diverse wetlands to develop and form a wider protection. And there are positive outcomes where wetlands are re-established: Marsh Harriers, Avocets, Spoonbills and Bitterns are breeding successfully again, and Cranes are once more in our skies. The subject was of considerable local interest, and we all left with a deeper understanding of the complexities of coastal change and its management.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, February 9th, 7.30pm in the Southwold Arts Centre, IP18 6JP. Paul Davies from the RSPB, will be talking about the Beach Nesting Birds of East Anglia. Admission £4, refreshments included. Under 25's free. All are welcome.

Nurses Breaks – A Petition

I am writing this article about the few days I experienced in the Emergency Dept. at James Paget Hospital. I arrived at around 1pm on Thursday the 8th December, after being asked by my GP to head there via lift or by ambulance. There was no one available, and I was not going to take up an ambulance, so I drove. When I arrived, I only waited a short time to be seen. I received an ECG and bloods were taken, the results being a bit of a dodgy heart (not the doctor's words, MINE). I decided to write this on day 2 of my stay. I was woken up by a lovely kind nurse (she did stress how sorry she was to do that). In the part I was in, which holds about 15 patients, there were ONLY 2 TRAINED NURSES, run off their feet. 86 patients at one point waiting to be seen in the Department.

The night I stayed one of the lovely nurses had said, on my asking, that “she had started at 7.30am, finishing at around 19.30pm with 20 minutes break”. Quite frankly, I think this is disgusting.

We literally put our lives in these lovely nurses’ hands and are looked after seamlessly, and they are getting no time to rest at all. I’m not sure what the answer is, but if I can make a tiny bit of a difference by sharing my thoughts on my experiences, it may make more people talk about it.

I would appreciate if you could add to our petition to get more break times for our wonderful Nurses, Doctors and Hospital Staff.
