Suffolk Wildlife Trust News and Meeting

The Wilder Landscape Manager of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust, Sam Hanks, gave a talk to our local group about the wider aspects of land management and biodiversity in our county, with a particular reference to farming. The Trust is part of a wider network of organisations encouraging farmers to participate in regenerative agriculture. The aims are to combat climate change by focusing on nourishing the soil, increasing crop diversity, improving water quality, capturing carbon, and regenerating lost woodlands and hedgerows. There is no single organised approach yet, and pesticides and herbicides are still in use, but there is enthusiasm across the region , with organisations such as the Nature Friendly Farming Network taking part.

The Trust sees its role as enabling people to bring about change, and thus it gives free advice to farmers, community projects and individuals. There are farm clusters – locally the Blyth Valley, where farmers can meet together, share ideas, and receive support. There are Stewardship projects, one of which is to alleviate flooding with attenuation ponds, which flood in the winter, reducing the run off downstream. Encouragement to add diversity to the land is exemplified at Nonsuch organic farm, where Sam is the manager. Here, the fertilised hayfield will return to its old meadow status. Hedgerows are being replanted: one stretch is to be four metres wide, and has been hand-strewn with local hedgerow seeds in an experiment to see how well this method will work. Elsewhere on the farm, ponds have been excavated to add to biodiversity, and to supply drinking water for stock animals. A range of fruit and nut trees are being planted. It's very much a work in progress.

There were some inspirational ideas, and we were heartened to remember that we can all help in the process, both in our own plots and gardens, and by supporting local producers.

Our next meeting is at the Arts Centre, Southwold, IP18 6JP, on Thursday, 13th April at 7.30pm. There will be a brief AGM, followed by a film, "Secret Rivers – the Waveney", featuring Paul Heiney. No admission fee but a small charge for drinks.

Wilder Wenhaston Update

Local residents can hardly fail to have noticed the huge amount of tree and hedgerow planting taking place on Fox Hill just the other side of the Bramfield Road from Blackheath. Some 4500 native trees and 3500 hedgerow plants have been planted - a huge effort by a disparate group of volunteers co-ordinated by the Wilder Wenhaston Group.

Later on this year the central part of the site will be sown with wild bird cover, which should mean plenty of much needed winter food for species such as Linnet and Yellowhammer. I was pleased to hear my first Skylark of the year singing in mid February while helping, and Woodlark has also been recorded already.

The planting at Fox Hill has the most visual impact, but the other projects mentioned in last month's WW also continue apace; the initial results from the survey forms on Wild Gardens which were included with the February edition are being analysed. A number of village gardens will be open on 4th June to demonstrate how you can help wildlife close to home.

The quality of the the processed sewage that is discharged into our rivers and also recycled through spreading on local farmland, which then ends up in local water courses is being investigated. Our current sewage works are not built for the 21st century; we can all help by thinking about what we put down our drains as well as lobbying for better infrastructure. We hope to provide further detailed information for local residents about this important issue in due course.

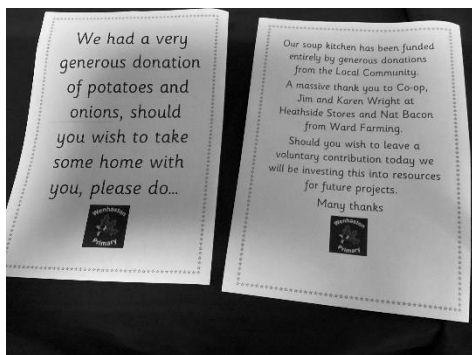

Wenhaston School Soup Kitchen



A big thank you to everyone who visited our Community Soup kitchen... we were overwhelmed with the support and kind comments we received.

The initiative was set up to develop our Design and Technology curriculum, so plans began back in February where Oak Class wrote

letters to local businesses to ask for their support in the form of contributions for ingredients. The response to this was positive and we secured all of the ingredients needed through donations...special thanks to The CO-OP, Jim and Karen Wright at Wenhaston Shop and Nat Bacon of Ward Farms. The whole school was then given their role in the operation... Acorns (Reception) were to bake biscuits for pudding, Seedlings (Years 1 and 2) were to make and bake the rolls, Saplings (Years 3 and 4) were to research and make a soup as were Oak Class (Years 5 and 6.)

Time was spent in Key Stage 2 finding out about the nutrition and seasonality of the ingredients and recipes were selected for a test batch. Saplings chose from 2 recipes and decided on Leek and Potato, whereas Oak class tested and tasted 6 different recipes before voting for the favourite: Tomato and Basil. The children had to publicise their event so they made posters which were distributed by hand at the Local Pancake lunch event and published in the village magazine. They also made menus, analysed and listed any allergens and looked into how to cost their soups.

On the day the entire operation was staffed by the children in Oak Class and we were so proud to see how they conducted themselves with members of the public. We would like to express how very grateful we are for the contributions we received on the day. We will send a donation to the Local food bank and also be able to purchase resources for further DT projects. We look forward to future community events such as this one.

A straight sided container 10cm diameter X 20cms high (glass/ plastic/ tin can be square or round).

Enough straight sticks (20/30) to cover around the outside of the container,

2/3 cms taller than the container's height (willow/ Croun/ sycamore)

Piece of bark the height of the container,

2 strong rubber bands to go around the container,

Raffia/string/ribbon to cover the rubber bands,

Bunch of 10 tulips or daffodils,

3 tall decorative twigs,

Scissors/secateurs,

Table covering.

Winter to spring on the marshes

The signs of spring have been a long time coming. As the snowdrops bloom their last, the other bulbs start to show yellow and blue. The trees are barely showing any green leaf buds. On 15th March, known as the Ides of March by the Romans, seen by them as the end of winter and the old year, we woke to a hard frost .

The rising sun's fierce light illuminated the ridges of the field, and the icy patches and spikes of grass on the grazing meadows. The early warmth of its rays raised a mist from the land, further enhancing the beauty of the scene.

Walking out towards the river a pair of mallards, already together, flew up from the ditch beside the path and over the fields.

I heard the sweet tones of a Cetti's warbler from the place it has sung from throughout winter. As I stood on the bridge

across the river I looked across the reeds, each stem shining in the early sunlight and heard the repeated song of the reed bunting with its rolling notes and trills.

Both these small birds stay here throughout the winter, living among the the reeds, heard more than seen. The reed bunting does venture out of hiding more than most of the small birds of the reed beds,



often sitting up on the overhead wires, the male showing its distinct black head markings.

On the way back as the sun rose further and I could feel its warmth, the chorus of birdsong around me increased, the skylark rising over the grassland singing insistently. Long tailed and blue tits were singing out

from nearby trees ,alongside the background calls of the rooks and wood pigeon,and the squawk of a distant pheasant.

The frost on the daffodils lining the track had now melted and the flower heads were beginning to rise back up. It's going to be a beautiful day. Next week will be the spring equinox and we can hope for the greening and bursting out of all the plants as spring finally arrives.

What's Been Going On in Vicarage Grove?

As you walk the path between the trees – trees bare as I write this but about to bloom in their spring green – you may have noticed a mysterious circling barrier on one side, beautifully woven from holly and undergrowth to form a 'dead hedge'. If you peer over, you will discover what looks like at first sight an area of – well, nothing much at all.

But...this is where vital coppicing took place last month.

What is coppicing?

Coppicing is an ancient woodland management technique – amazingly it probably dates as far back as the Stone Age – in which trees are cut down almost to ground level to stimulate the growth of new shoots from their stump (or 'stool'). A tree that has been coppiced doesn't die of old age, as coppicing maintains it at a young stage, thus increasing its life span. Coppicing encourages biodiversity too, as it opens up the woodland floor to sunlight, so allowing a wide range of plants and small wildlife to flourish. The dead hedge in the Grove will protect the stools from deer.

As you walk through Vicarage Grove at the moment, you'll also see clumps of the distinctive long, narrow leaves of our native bluebells, poking up under the trees. It won't be too long before their glorious flowers illuminate the woodland floor.



It's a bit longer to wait until our AGM on 25th May but do make a note of this date. The theme this year is *Gardens for Wildlife*. More details to come.

Mothers Union

It was good to be back with everyone at the March meeting. We had an interesting meeting when we welcomed Deb Johnson from the Lighthouse Women's Refuge in Ipswich. Her talk was titled "Domestic Abuse is Everybody's Business". I think that she made us all think more seriously about domestic abuse and all that can and does happen.

Those now supported through the Lighthouse Refuge are both women and children, and after the initial reception at the Lighthouse, they are found suitable accommodation well away from the Suffolk area, for their own safety. They are then provided with everything they need from clothes, food etc, as in many cases they will have fled to the refuge without anything. There is a 20% increase of people needing refuge on previous years and figures show that 1 in 3 women and 1 in 6 men are affected in their lifetime.

In the next few months our branch hopes to provide bags containing some of the necessary items ie. toiletries etc, which they need on arrival at the Refuge. These will then be taken to Ipswich.

It was also good to have some of the Halesworth members joining us at the meeting and we are very pleased to have them with us.
