Wenhaston Wilder Garden Trail

For Sunday 4th June, the Wilder Wenhaston Garden and Pond subgroup, that is Tony G, Sue G, Judy M, Ann F, Jill D & Mike G, planned everything possible to make the Wilder Garden Trail enjoyable, informative, safe and fun for those taking part; an opportunity for



seeing and exchanging ideas about improving our gardens for wildlife.

The only thing left to chance was the weather! Thankfully, it was as beautiful a June day as we could possibly have asked for. A rough tally showed between 50 and 80 visitors per garden, an amazing response especially given other garden events in the near area that weekend. Delicious home-baked goods and refreshments were offered at either end of the village and were enjoyed by hungry and thirsty garden 'Trailers'.

The gardens chosen for the trail were selected based on responses given to, and interest shown in, the Wilder Garden Survey, completed by 95-households earlier this year. We wanted to be able to showcase a variety of approaches and ideas of ways to 'Garden for Wildlife'. In those chosen part, or most, of the garden is maintained to benefit wildlife in its many forms: insects, birds, and mammals, by providing good food and water sources as well as nesting or breeding environments. Questions asked on the day, and feedback since, suggests this strategy was effective.

So much work goes into planning an event like this that it is very rewarding when it goes as well as this did. We are truly thankful for all who joined in the trail from near and far (I understand our furthest visitors travelled from Felixstowe!). Thanks to those who contributed baked goods, to Becky Canham- talented designer of the map and poster artwork- and, not least, the nine 'wilder' gardens/ers who kindly opened them to be visited. Most of us were able to enjoy a preview Trail on Friday and loved what we saw, coming away with new ideas to try out at home. We hope you did too.

Look out for us on a stall at the Village Show on July 16th where we will have a display about, and photos of, the day, such as the front garden mini meadow, with mown paths, as below. There will also be information about other exciting projects that Wilder Wenhaston have underway. 

The Annual Meeting of the Blyth Woods Group

On 25th May in the Village Hall, an audience gathered expectantly to hear news of our work over the past year from our Chair, Alan Miller. Alan began by thanking all the trustees, particularly Sally Amery in her first year as treasurer, for successfully transfering our accounts to Nat West - hopefully, easier to deal with than Lloyds Bank! He went on to cover our main activities and achievements, starting with the breeding birds survey, now carried out and the nest boxes monitored. Twenty-nine boxes had produced one hundred and eighty-

five blue tits and twenty-one great tits. Barn owls bred in the boxes for the first time, fledging three young. Our summer work parties involved weeding round the base of the trees and cutting the meadow area in Malsters Little Field. Once we had raked the site, we spread a trailer-load of green hay from one of the Illketshall commons, which should help add new species of wild flowers.



Dorothy Casey, former Conservation Manager at SWT, carried out a plant survey on Malsters, which included the restored pond. She found a rare stonewort, Fragile Stonewort, only found on five other sites in Suffolk.

We took part in the various events in the village hall: the Village Show, Bazaar and Community Day, as well as holding our annual Friends' summer Picnic and Bioblitz, recording everything we could find in a couple of hours. We purchased a battery polesaw between us and the Commons Group, to help manage overhanging branches and any other obstructions over and around footpaths.

Last winter, we removed the invasive holly in Vicarage Grove and were helped by the AONB volunteer team, who used the cut remains to build a 'dead hedge' around our experimental coppice area. This should stop deer browsing the cut stools as they regrow.

One major job was restoring the pond in the copse in Grove Piece. The silt in the bottom was a metre and a half deep. It will be interesting to observe how it recovers, and it may even reveal another rare stonewort once the vegetation starts regrowing. Some dead ash adjacent to the footpath in Vicarage Grove was felled at the same time.

Heather Phillips kindly gave us some snowdrops and they have been planted in the copse.

Marie Rolfe reported on Wenhaston Primary School's visits to Grove Woods for various activities over the year, which she has been instrumental in initiating, with enthusiastic support from the head, Chris Stone. She ended by mentioning that on Friday 9th June there would be Teddy Bears' Picnic for the Reception class and years 5 and 6 (Oaks class) would visit for a creative writing session on 12th. After a break with wine available and delicious free home-made refreshments, Alan Miller went on to talk about Wilder Wenhaston, first mooted in last year's Annual Meeting, and all it has achieved in its first year.

Spring into summer on the marshes

Along the river the new green growth of reeds has reached well over half way up the old dry straws of last years growth, which will soon fall down into the water to be taken away downriver.



In late April the reed beds were filled with a cacophony of warbler song. The migratory reed warblers and sedge warblers were back in large numbers and setting up home. Their fellow resident warblers who have stayed all winter were also heard and seen; one easier to spot than the others, a male reed bunting with his distinctive black and white head markings, which darted across the path, perched on a long reed swaying in the wind and disappeared off across the

ditch. The Cetti's warbler still calls out regularly from the vegetation along the ditch near the end of our garden.

On the fields near the river and next to ditches, there have been numerous pairs of shelduck, either flying around in pursuit of each other or settling in pairs on the ground. For a while there was a pair settled near to a family of hares with two young leverets, who at one point stood up on hind legs to play boxing. The birds and these mammals, both ground breeding species, seemed unperturbed by each other's families and thankfully seemed safe in their well chosen spot on the edge of the reeds.



The fields either side of the river have been flooded at times over the winter and spring, providing valuable inland water areas for all sorts of birds. The pool on this side is now completely dried up, but the wetness persists on the other side, in the field towards Blyford bridge.

On several occasions I have been able to watch large numbers of swallows and swifts, also house martins and sand martins, flying and swooping over the pools feeding on insects. All these migratory birds seem now to be settling back in the village, despite the cold north easterly winds.

Numbers seem lower than usual, but when the wind drops and the sun shines, you can see them again either over the fields or over the water.

The cuckoos have been heard regularly from mid May, now less often as they succeed in attracting a female, who will have gone on to lay an egg in

one of the warblers' tiny nests, before returning to Africa. Turtle doves are rarely seen here, but I was lucky enough to see a beautiful specimen up close, sitting on the bare branch of a small dead tree next to the path on the other side of the river. As I passed by it took off and flew over to the Wenhaston side of the water.

The marshes are quieter now as the warblers and skylarks get busy rearing their young. Let's hope for peaceful warmer days now that June is here, with sun, less wind, and some rain for all of us and the wildlife.
