

When Birds Sing.

At our September meeting of the Blyth Valley and Southwold Suffolk Wildlife group, we welcomed Saffron Summerfield to talk about the nature of bird song. Saffron is a musician, composer, and bird song recordist, who sometimes incorporates birdsong into her work. She started the evening with a folk song about the cuckoo to intrigue us, and followed this by exploring some of the reasons birds sing – to establish territories, or attract a mate, but also for fun, as some recent research shows. The way birds produce sound, through their syrinx, a bellow-like structure, can create considerable volume, as we know from listening to the tiny wren. Tone and pitch vary widely, from the goldcrest at the high end, to the bittern's boom at the low end, audible for up to three miles. Whilst most birds learn to sing from their parents, possibly while still unhatched, there are exceptions, and others might learn from different adults. The extraordinary marsh warbler learns a variety of bird songs along its route from East Africa,

and can reproduce them in an unbroken rill that can last for half an hour, in its efforts to beat its rivals in the mating game. Recorded birdsong can have a calming effect, and has been used in public spaces for this reason, and many musicians have been fascinated and inspired to use bird songs in their work. The evening ended with Saffron playing a beautiful recording of a robin singing, with her guitar and quiet verbal accompaniment. It was a stimulating evening, and very much enjoyed.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, October 12th, at 7.30pm, at the Arts Centre, Southwold, IP18 6JP. Kate Osborne will talk about Suffolk Shingle: Tales of Treasure and Trash. Admission is £4, to include refreshment. Under 25's free. All are welcome.



Swifts Update

It's early September as I write this and the last Swifts have now left our shores for a long journey south. We miss seeing the small squadrons racing over our homes screaming as they go, masters of the skies, and feel honoured that they fly so far to raise their families with us. Numbers have dropped substantially over recent decades and to help them find homes when they arrive, swift boxes have been put up around the village and we put two up on the front of our house. For the last three years the tweeter fixed below the boxes, called to them in vain to come and have a look, but in spite of some birds bombing the box, (flying close by), no one seemed to take up the offer. It isn't easy to see the boxes from our garden and we had resigned ourselves to another year without any residents.

But one day in early August as I walked round to the back garage door near to the boxes, a swift flew straight up to a box and left again shortly after. The adult birds collect boluses of 300-500 insects in a pouch under their beak and don't visit the nest frequently, so the timing was fortunate. I asked Alan Miller, our local wildlife guru and registered bird ringer, if he could investigate and sure enough, we had



twins! How very exciting - it was worth the long wait! They were nearly ready to fledge having been growing for 6 to 8 weeks and gaining in strength by doing wing and tail press ups and all completely unknown to us. Four days later, early one morning, they soared off into the sky and away. Stay safe little birds in your life on the wing and we look forward to your return next year.

We will put a camera in the box and hopefully will be able to watch next year's brood growing up.

Improved Bus Links for Wenhaston

Some minor changes have been made to local bus services from 3rd September. The main interest for Wenhaston is the 99A which has been improved by adding buses to make the service almost hourly Monday to Saturday between Halesworth and Southwold only. To travel on to Lowestoft change onto the 99 at Southwold. Halesworth now has a direct bus service to Norwich – the X41 runs hourly Monday to Saturday via Bungay. From Wenhaston it would be possible to link up with the 99A but it's not a connecting service. BorderBus has extended the 522 Aldeburgh – Halesworth route to Beccles, Monday – Friday.

Timetables. First Bus do not provide paper timetables – the new 99A times are printed here in the Warbler. You can obtain a photocopy (free of charge) of local bus services if you ask at the counter in Halesworth Library, Bridge Street.

Summer to Autumn on the Marshes

There are lots of plump red hips on the Dog-rose bushes sharing space on some branches with the curious orangey pink galls known as 'robin's pincushions' caused by a wasp 'Diplolepis rosae', which lays her eggs in the leaf buds, causing the tissues to distort into a collection of multiple colourful wispy extensions.

In the hedgerow on the way back there are a couple of Guelder rose bushes with stunning bright red bunches of glossy berries, the best ones I have ever seen. All the Hawthorn trees and bushes are covered thickly with a multitude of darker red berries. Of course, the glorious show of blackberries should not be forgotten. Bramble plants come in a multitude of different genetic variations which accounts for the differing sizes and taste intensity of different bushes. With so many this year the picker can be choosy. Although everything started slowly this spring and early

summer due to excess cold, many living things seemed to have thrived in the subsequent wet and now warm conditions. Owls are doing well on the marshes, with four barn owls seen flying one evening, and the tawny owls calling across the fields most nights. In the daytime there are two juvenile buzzards and their parent, flying and calling to each other frequently over the neighbouring field, heard through the hedge. I have been lucky to have one of the young ones fly less than twenty feet above me as it made its way over the garden to hunt over the maize field on the other side. There seem to be plenty of mice and voles around as prey.

We have continued to see groups of swallows and martins gathering and flying along the river, feeding as they start their migration back to Africa. The reed beds are almost silent now, as even the usually noisy resident Cetti's warbler is quiet, and the migratory warblers have all gone to Africa.
