

June's Wildlife Garden "tips and jobs"

Insects and worms are essential for our gardens, the wider ecosystem and for life on earth!

Ladybirds, lacewings, and hoverflies are natural predators of aphids, mites, and mealy bugs. Fruiting plants are helped by pollinators – e.g. bees, sawflies, wasps and beetles. Spiders, beetles, aphids, worms, are prey for garden birds and hedgehogs. Worms aerate the soil. Ground beetles love eating slugs and snails, while parasitic wasps will kill caterpillars, ants, and aphids.

Are you growing herbs in pots or your garden? Many herbs attract insect pollinators: rosemary, sage, fennel, chives, and wild thyme amongst others and so useful in recipes! Lacewings particularly like parsley.

If mowing long grass after 'No Mow May' be mindful of any wildlife that has set up home in the longer grass. Or perhaps leave it long for longer?

Ponds or small water sources provide hydration and a bathing spot for wildlife as summer starts hotting up. Keep your eyes peeled: if lucky – your tadpoles become froglets and toads this month! Look out for damselflies and dragonflies as they pair up and mate, laying their eggs on pond plants and grass. You may see larvae emerging as adults, leaving their exuviae (the case they emerge from) stuck to the plant they were laid on. Fascinating to look at.

Wildlife ponds can need routine maintenance to naturally combat blanket and duckweed either by manually skimming or adding barley straw extract. A solar-powered aerator can be simple and cost effective remedy.

Wilder Wenhaston River Group -Water quality and You



The poor state of all the UK rivers, which include the Blyth, has been widely publicised and the finger quite rightly has, in the main, been pointed at the water companies. Lack of investment and poor regulation means that our sewage treatment works are inadequate and continually discharging untreated

waste into our rivers and seas.

Whilst most of the local sewage treatment works were built in the 1950's and 60's they are expected to deal with a greatly increased 21st century population, along with all the modern-day household chemicals, pharmaceuticals, and a changing climate.

We can put all the blame on government and the water companies and do nothing,, which means nothing will change anytime soon, in fact things can only get worse until legislation and increased monitoring forces companies to clean up their act.

Is there anything we can do to help the situation? After all, it is our waste they are dealing with, and so the problem of polluted water and water over-use really begins with **Us**.

Therefore, what can we do as individuals. Many of us are on water meters and so pay for every litre of water we use, whether we drink it, wash with it or flush the loo. Reducing what we use helps reduce the amount that must go through the treatment works and saves us

money. In the loo the message is 'if its brown flush it down' or 'if its yellow let it mellow' and only toilet tissue no wet wipes. Put a bucket in the shower and then use it to water the garden.

In the kitchen buy phosphate free detergents (washing up liquid, dish washer tablets and washing powders). Most treatment works do not have the facility to strip out phosphate and so it builds up in our rivers, creating algal blooms which reduce oxygen and therefore affects fish and other aquatic wildlife. I was amazed while checking out the various washing powders and liquids in a local supermarket and some packets actually say 'Harmful to aquatic life'. Quite! Where do they think the water from our washing machines ends up! Similarly, do not put pharmaceuticals down the drain, instead return them to a pharmacist for safe disposal. Drugs of all kinds are being found in our rivers. The changes in weather patterns now means the frequency of heavy rainfall is becoming an ever-increasing phenomenon, which means the times that the treatment works are overwhelmed is increasing and new housing only adds to this. Rather than water the garden with a hose from the mains, install water butts to catch rain. Every litre saved is a litre less going through storm overflows carrying untreated sewage with it.

Life in the wilder garden!

I have come to eat my lunch by my pond as the dragons (flies) and damselflies are really busy today. And it is all happening here!



A little frog made a big splash as it left the pond for the grass bank, but it was disturbed by a female greenfinch who came along for a drink at the pond edge, so it plopped back in again. I watched the greenfinch for quite a while as she made her way along the water's edge having a drink, and it seemed just chilling out! She wandered in amongst the pond grasses and eventually settled down for a snooze on the edge of one of pond plant baskets, so I carried on with my warming salad!

There are 2 female common darters ovipositing (egg laying), being guarded by a male who is darting around his territory, defined maybe by the pond edges. 3 pairs of common blue damselflies and 1 pair of large red damselflies are also



ovipositing and a pair of 4 spotted chasers have also arrived. The greenfinch left but returned not long afterwards. I am wondering how early greenfinch young fledge. Is she tired after raising her first brood, not bred or lost her clutch to a predator? Anyway, she is welcome at the pond. In amongst all this greenfinch watching, very exciting as I've not seen one in the pond before, a grass snake did a little tour emerging first from the deeper water to move into the shallower area where the bog-bean grows.



I've no idea where it is now but I haven't seen it leave the pond. I do hope it hasn't gone to find my frog for its lunch! I find the empty grass snake egg cases in my compost heap, but have never seen the real thing, although my visiting family have on one occasion. There are newts moving around and a great crested newt is just hanging suspended in the deeper water.



This is the first year I have seen great crested newts in my pond so I'm really pleased. It is fascinating how wildlife will find a pond. When it was first dug and still filling with water

the dragon flies started to come! It was all very bare, no plants but it was still investigating and 5 years on there are all these creatures enjoying it.

Having spoken to a friend on the commons group wildlife walk this morning about coal tits in gardens there has been one singing while I have been watching the pond.



Gold finches passed through but didn't stop. Maybe my sitting here put them off. A buzzard has been overhead and swifts scream over every now and then. The first of my water lilies have come into flower today, not native species but lovely none the less. In fact, it's all rather lovely really!




