## Blyth Woods group A new season

S I WRITE, CANDLEMAS, the 2<sup>nd</sup> February, has just passed, the Christian celebration that originated in the ancient Celtic festival of Imbolc, which marked the beginning of spring with the longer hours of daylight. There are signs of the coming spring all around us: in our gardens, where daffodils buds are swelling, snowdrops in brilliant white clusters hang their bells, and buttery yellow aconites have appeared (known in the old days as 'choirboys' in Suffolk because of the bright green 'ruffs' around their necks), while in the hedges blackthorn and hawthorn show the first signs of budding.

**Progress on St Peter's Pightle** 

However, it was not particularly spring-like weather for the valiant tree-planters on St Peter's Pightle, who worked through wind and rain to reach a grand total so far of 2,800 young trees, planted over our fortnightly planting sessions. By the time we finish this planting season the total will be 3,200. Well done, and a huge thank you to everyone who helped. If you walk that way (along the path at the end of Church Lane) and look to your right, you will find an impressive array of tree

guards sticking up across the field, like the prickles of a hedgehog. For instance, on the 17<sup>th</sup> of last month over a thousand saplings were planted in a single day, by



adult volunteers and school children from Wenhaston Primary, who brought along twenty-four trees and some additional oak saplings from their tree nursery. You can see how enthusiastic the children were in the photograph! For information on further work party dates, see contact details below. Do come along – it's fun, rewarding and the weather is improving!

#### **Footpath Art**

If you receive your Warbler before the end of February, hurry out and create a piece of footpath art using the natural materials around you – stones, twigs, leaves, dead moss – along the main paths of Vicarage Grove, Malster's and Grove Piece. We are hoping to take some great photographs for a forthcoming Warbler!

### **Alexanders**

#### smyrnium olusatrum-

THEY ARE BACK with a vengeance! The glossy green leaves of the Alexander plant are everywhere.

They are now taking over our hedgerows and crowding out the native flowers – cow parsley, cowslips etc. You will have seen them encroaching all around the village.

Now is the time to deal with them, before they flower. There are various ways of controlling their spread: digging up the roots; cutting them down before they flower; or even eating them! The plant is edible, and picked early, before the shoots become tough, they can be used as celery. Even the roots can be roasted like parsnips.



Alexanders, smyrnium olusatrum, was brought to the UK by the Romans as a substitute for asparagus – but they are now becoming a menace. We could all clear a few metres to let our wildflowers breathe.

## Save our Swifts Wenhaston action group

A S I WRITE SPRING still feels a while away, but we can think about the sounds and sights of swifts arriving back in the village in May, forming acrobatic screaming parties as they congregate and feed on insects above our heads, having flown thousands of miles from their winter homes in Central and Southern Africa.

We are now providing lots of homes for these amazing birds, both natural sites and installed nest boxes. We now have a total of 40 boxes and 21 known natural sites. There were 28 known active nests last year. Seven occupied nest boxes were directly observed, leaving 33 still to be used. We could increase occupancy rates for never used boxes by playing swift calls to attract either new breeders, as well as more mature birds

If you would like more information about how callers work and their impact, or you would be interested in fitting nest boxes or increasing the number you have, please contact me at

Suffolk *Save our Swifts* currently have supplies of nest boxes for



suitable sites and I can put you in touch, or you can have a look at the website suffolkbirdgroup.org for further information.

Please let me know if you do install any new boxes or have observed swifts entering under or leaving from under your roof tiles so I collate the records on the RSPB Swiftmapper website. If you interested in coming along to a group meeting let me know. The group carries out swift counts twice in July and organises a Swift Pint Walk ending up at *The Star* pub which hosts one of the best Swift colonies in the village.

Finally please be aware that when renovation or new building work is carried out previous nest sites can be removed. It is also a good opportunity to fit boxes, get a caller and set up a new colony in our village. Thank you for caring about these incredible birds.
