



Blyth Woods Group Spring is Sprung

SI WRITE, we have just had a tantalising week of glorious sunshine, though true to spring's typically unpredictable weather we are forecast to return to cold northeasterlies in the next few days! The warmth has brought out the daffodils, which are blooming everywhere in the village, their brilliant vellow trumpets shining in the sun. But daffodils are not just beautiful flowers: an extract of their bulbs is being tested to reduce the harmful methane gas given off by cattle, which would be a significant contribution to climate change.

uge thanks too from the Blyth Woods group, to all the volunteers who have helped us plant trees and hedging plants in St Peter's Pightle. We now have 3,300 young trees (and it's ongoing!) of 28 different species and the two ponds are starting to fill with water. Grass and wildflower seed will be planted in the open area when the weather is suitable, and fruit tree saplings in early summer. There is a special tree nursery section for the children of Wenhaston Primary, planted with their own school-grown seedlings.

Our busy programme with the school has continued. Years 3 and 4 found 'Tracks and Trails' in Merton Wood on 14th March, while Years 1 and 2 learned about 'Woodland Creatures' in Grove Woods, including how to make a bumblebee shelter, on 21st March.

On 28th March the children will be talking about their work with Blyth Woods at the Village Hall, 4-6pm. Open to all.



You may have noticed as you walk past the Pightle (which can be found on the right of the path that leads from Church Lane) a new gate at what will be the visitors' entrance. At the moment this is closed until work there is complete, when everyone will be welcome.

Wilder Wenhaston Garden Trail

F ARE THANKFUL to everyone who welcomed us into their gardens and now have generously agreed to take part in the Wilder Garden Trail on 17thMay. We know you will enjoy seeing these gardens – small and large, and all encouraging wildlife and biodiversity. Hear gardeners' stories of transformation and their future plans.

On Saturday 17th May, the Wilder Garden Trail, open 11am -3.30pm, starts at St Peter's churchyard. Here you can collect a map, with a brief description of each garden, to help you plan your route. Ten gardens are open around the village. From those along Back Road and Blackheath, to those with views across Church Farm Marshes and the Blyth Valley. So do allow plenty of time. Entry by donation on the day, towards event costs. Limited parking is available along the route.

There will be activities for accompanied children in the churchyard, including a wildlife 'I Spy' to complete along the Trail.

VER THE LAST TWO years, the stalwart volunteers of the Wilder Wenhaston River Group have been testing and surveying the Blyth and its tributaries. You can read our report on the Wenhaston website:

What you can do to help

t's all very well blaming the big players such as the Water Companies for polluting our waterways, but WE can also help reduce pollution!

You may recall in previous Warblers, we pointed out the hazards of pet flea treatments (kill river insect life) and detergents containing phosphates (overgrowth of algae). Here's another category of things we put down sinks and toilets which are harmful to the environment: toilet cleaners and sink un-blockers. Have a look at the labels on the ones in your cupboard, and you'll probably see "Harmful to aquatic life with long lasting effects", followed by "Avoid release to the environment". And guess where they go - down the drain, through the sewage works and into

the environment. Yes, and that includes the popular Toilet Duck type products. Alternatives? A quick look on the internet for ecofriendly cleaners will give you ample choice, for example toilet cleaners such as Bio-D, Miniml, Bower Collective, Ecoleaf (other brands are available!), and what's more, most of them sell refills to reduce plastic waste.

Sewage spill on Wenhaston marshes

few weeks ago there was a spill of raw sewage on the Thorington/Wenhaston marshes noted as a splendid wildlife reserve and administered by Suffolk Wildlife Trust. Apparently, the main pipe carrying Bramfield's sewage to the treatment works at Wenhaston has collapsed. The extent of the damage caused is not known, and an enquiry to Anglian Water regarding the extent and duration of the spill elicited a response starting: 'As Anglian Water is not a public authority, we do not have to provide information under the Freedom of Information Act' but

they have 'passed your query over to our Environmental Information Request Team so see if they are able to provide you with any information at all If they are able, they aim to contact within the next twenty working days.' I'm not holding my breath (well, I will when walking near the marshes). Wil Harvey

EFORE YOU CALL the Canine Protection League, this catchy title is a new film from the creative hub of deepest Wenhaston (eat your heart out Walberswick movie moguls). And when the credits roll, Paul Rainbird's name will be up there in big letters. How come? A year ago, Paul decided to have a go at play writing, so he enrolled for a script writing workshop run by the Ink Festival. A bit non-plussed, I knew that Paul has had an illustrious (and award-winning) career in classic boat building and does serious house DIY, but I hadn't realised that over 20 years ago he studied English literature at UEA, where he met his wife Heidi, and then did a teaching diploma there.

Back to the *Ink* story: written as a theatre script, it is fictional – starting from a holiday memory of hearing dogs barking in the distance. He knocked it into shape over two days in Crete and submitted it to an Ink Festival workshop above The White Swan pub in Halesworth (future blue plaque...?). To his delight and surprise, it was read by two actors in front of 15 people, they loved it. So, a month later after a bit of feedback and editing, he passed on the script to

Henry Tomlinson for some further feedback and pointers.

Three months later got a phone call from producer, Henry Tomlinson (son of actor David Tomlinson), who said he had read and loved it and wanted to turn it into a film! Fairytale stuff indeed, but more: Henry enlisted world famous cinematographer Stephen Hall and — Dame Maureen Lipman and Carolina Gonnelli to star in it. Oh, and Betty the Labrador from Barking Mad Dog Training at Ilketshall St Lawrence.


The film is a bit of a Wenhaston family affair as well, with son-inlaw Jack Northover composing and making the soundtrack, and Heidi doing some nifty hairdressing... From inception to finished film in approximately 13 months, its Private Charity Premiere is at The Cut on April 4th (if you're lucky there might be a few tickets left, and the charity is 'Survivors in Transition' based in Ipswich). It will subsequently be screened at 50 film festivals worldwide in the popular short film format at 22 minutes long. Short films such as this are regarded as a calling card for bigger full-length films. The story? All I can tell you is it's moving, poignant,

The future? Paul is already at work on several new stage scripts; who

A Life Working in Landscape

THE FEBRUARY MEETING of the local Blyth Valley and Southwold group of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust welcomed Anne Westover to talk about her life-long love of working in the countryside. Trained as a landscape architect, Anne has worked in many areas, from the leafy sections of Welwyn Garden City, to Leeds, to Norwich County Council, and now to smaller, local projects. She was involved in the preservation of old and significant trees, and in the overall maintenance of green areas. The beautiful Kett's Heights, above Norwich, was restored recently by the council, together with volunteers, and Anne designed the new metal gates there. It is well worth the climb. Keeping and planting screening trees was part of Anne's brief, and many of the pine trees at Sutton Hoo remain as a result, and are now very much part of that landscape.

There is much work being carried out at local level. Hedgerows that are over thirty years old now need permission to be grubbed out, and Suffolk hedges have been surveyed at a parish level to help provide this information. Local volunteer Tree Wardens help to propagate young trees, and involve the community in learning about and managing trees and hedgerows. Cemeteries can be havens for growing local species, and Wickham Market and Woodbridge were mentioned. Our native black poplar is in decline, and there are efforts to increase their numbers locally, for example, in Wenhaston.

Anne's job gave her a very wide brief, and her work with different councils gave us an idea of how decisions are made, and how tree and hedge management is carried out. It was an interesting and informative evening.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, March 13th at 7.30pm. Simon Dudhill from the Hawk and Owl Trust will tell us about his work with barn owls and red kites. This is our annual visit to the Village Hall, Hall Road, Wenhaston IP19 9EP. Entrance is £4, to include refreshments. All are welcome.
