## Marshes spill - follow-up

N APRIL'S WARBLER we reported a leak of sewage from Bramfield's sewage pipe onto the Thorington marshes, an Environmentally Sensitive Area. Anglian Water has responded thus:

The spillage was an overflow from a manhole, and promptly attended by an Anglian Water team. The spill area was 100 sq m, drained by two streams. Sewage contamination (measured by ammonia analysis) decreased over approximately three days. The cause was a 'deflected', ie twisted, plastic liner in the pipe. More spillage was prevented by diverting the sewage flow at a Bramfield pumping station into a holding sump for removal by tanker to the sewage treatment works. This will continue until the damaged lining is replaced.



## **Suffolk Wildlife Trust**

## **Barn Owls and Red Kites**

HE BLYTH VALLEY and Southwold group welcomed Simon Dudhill, from the Hawk and Owl Trust, to talk about his work with barn owls and red kites. Simon has worked for many years with owls and other raptors, monitoring their progress, and building nest boxes suitable for each type of bird. Owls don't build their own nests but rely largely on outbuildings and trees. The reduction of these habitats has meant that now 80% of barn owls use large oblong or triangular boxes, which you may well have seen. If a barn owl chick falls out of its box, it is in grave danger, as its parents do not look for it, or try to feed it. However, it is sometimes possible to foster a found chick by placing it in another carefully selected nest box. Simon and his colleagues monitor over 800 boxes in an area radiating out from Peterborough. They are licensed to check and ring the birds, and happily this species is now generally secure.

The second part of the talk was about red kites. Spain has asked the RSPB for help with its declining red kite population. Northamptonshire is highly populated with kites, and it is


here that Simon, as part of a team, is finding chicks to help with this project. The scheme has been running for three years now, and so far ninety-six chicks have settled into their new homes. The process is done with great care. Forestry England supplies experienced and licensed climbers who can bring chicks down to the ground. There is always one chick left in the nest, and the same nest is not revisited for three years. They are carefully and fully health checked, ringed, and fitted with GPS trackers before their journey to their new habitat. They are now breeding successfully with local birds, and rearing their young. The photography was beautiful, and it was a fascinating and enjoyable evening.

## Water in the Wildlife Garden

ITH THE INTEREST in creating wildlife-friendly areas within gardens coming to the fore, I feel now is a good time to remind everyone about the importance of ponds and water within the scheme of things. Any body of



water, however small, can add a new dimension to wildlife garden and is a habitat providing a home for a whole range of plants and animals. You do not need a large garden to develop a successful wildlife pond but there are ways of maximising its potential and several mistakes to avoid. Garden ponds have become a valuable substitute for the dwindling number of natural ponds. Some water dependent creatures have been very good at adapting to use them. Frogs, newts and dragonflies can build up large populations in a comparatively short time. I know of a dozen artificially lined ponds in Wenhaston supporting Great Crested newts. The smaller common or smooth newt is widespread even in very small ponds.

ish are *not* a good idea in a dedicated wildlife pond as they eat frogspawn and frog and newt tadpoles as well as the aquatic larvae of insects such as dragonflies and damselflies. Ducks and geese should also be discouraged.

Water attracts insects and so will bring in birds such as swifts and swallows as well as bats. Grass snakes may be seen in and around wildlife ponds.

I have only been able to touch upon this subject but there are matters of pond design, siting, construction and maintenance to consider as well as suitable habitat creation around the pond. I am happy to help anyone who is thinking of creating a wildlife pond.
