


Wilder Garden Trail May 17th 2025

Summer News from Blyth Woods

t our Annual Meeting on 22nd June in the Village Hall, followed by a short presentation with slides from Chair of Suffolk Tree Wardens, Richard Frost. There were delicious home-made nibbles available and wine from the bar, much appreciated by all who came.

Alan Miller began his Chairman's report by announcing that although he is standing down, Ann Edwards will be taking over for the next twelve months.

It has been a busy year for the Blyth Woods group, with work parties maintaining Grove Woods and clearing sessions in Vicarage Grove. We have continued to monitor our nest boxes in Grove Woods, though fewer broods were produced due to the poor spring last year. As the scrub starts to establish beneath the young trees, the numbers of robins, wrens and long-tailed tits are increasing.

We were saddened by the death of founder member, Serena Inskip, this year. Her memorial bench is now installed in a peaceful spot overlooking the pond in the Copse, off Grove Piece.

Our big news is that we have acquired an additional 4.5 acres of land, now known as St Peters

Pightle – the field at the end of Church Lane belonging to the Church Charity. It is being leased to us for 25 years, by which time it should be a small wood. Some 3,200 native hardwood trees have been planted, thanks to wonderful volunteers; two ponds dug, and the perimeter ditch restored – which should reduce flooding in the main street. It has been partly sown with a grass/wildflower mix funded by our local district councillors. The entrance gate, pedestrian gate and fence were all paid for by a grant from the AONB Community and Conservation Fund. Further planting will happen this winter, including fruit trees to create a community orchard.

Our expert Webmaster, John Rolfe, continues to improve our website, meanwhile.

enhaston Primary School has been very much involved with the Pightle, as Marie Rolfe and Jo Jarvis described in their impressive report. It won Village School of the Year, partly based on work done with Marie and Jo. Years 5 and 6 drew up design plans and took part in a tree planting day in January, using saplings grown in the school tree nursery. The whole

school helped plant a hedge beside the ditch in March. Natural Habitats worked with the school on mapping and surveying the area and making an animation film, which will be an unique record of the field: Creative Nature at St Peter's Pightle – BlythWoods; Mr Stone, Mrs Sacco and Ms Welby have been a wonderful support throughout. Saplings class laid and followed trails in Merton Wood, Seedlings used Grove Woods to support their work on creatures' homes, making bumblebee homes and stumperies. Other activities planned this summer, include 'How to sell a nest to a pigeon or a hole to a mouse..', setting up a tree nursery and a Teddy Bears' Picnic.

Sally Amery's excellent Treasury report showed that at the end of the year we had a healthy balance, a great achievement given the amount of work which has taken place over the year. We received several grants towards the cost of developing St Peter's Pightle. We are so grateful to our Friends, and to those who regularly send donations to support Blyth Woods.

Richard Frost, Chair of Suffolk Tree Wardens, then described their work, touching on the rare and endangered black poplar.

We'll be taking tables at the Village Show on **3**rd **August**. Displays, competitions and quizzes, goodies on sale and questions answered!
